LAFFERTY'S VOTE PASSES MEASURE

OREGON CONGRESSMAN HEARD HIS NAME ON THE THIRD CALL AND ANSWERS AYE TO WOOL REVISION BILL.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 16.—Representative Lafferty's vote carried the wool bill over Taft's veto. The first time his name was called he was in the chamber, but did not vote. The next time he was in the cloak room and did not hear his name. The third time he heard the call and voted aye. The vote was challenged, and Speaker Clark decided that Lafferty's and nine other similar votes should be counted. Without Lafferty's vote there would have been a tie and the bill lost.

The colored girl murdered Mrs. Ida Belote, a white woman, 73 years of age, at Hampton, Va. The girl was employed to do washing.

The condemned girl repulsed ministers up to the last. She walked unconcernedly to the electric chair.
