HEAVY EXPENSE FOR NEW SYSTEM

TELEPHONE COMPANY WILL INSTALL NEW SWITCHBOARD TO COST ABOUT \$25,000, SPENDING LIKE AMOUNT ON WIRING

Approximately \$50,000 for a renewed telephone system will be expended in this city by the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company in connection with entering its new home in the building recently constructed at Klamath avenue and Seventh street for the corporation.

Not only will the new switchboard be put in at an expense of probably \$25,000 to \$28,000, but, according to L. R. Robertson, manager of the Klamath Falls office, a like amount will probably be expended in equipping part of the city with new poles and doing away with cross arms in the more thickly built up part of the city. The latter feature of the renewed system will embrace the stringing of wires in metal conduits, or wrappers, capable of holding 50 to 600 wires.

The new switchboard, ordered by the company about six months ago, and being made by the General Electric company at its shops in Hawthorne, near Chicago, will probably be put aboard the cars there within the next week, and may reach here early next month, so that the company can be using it in the new building by the date set, October 1st.

This board will have, when put in, a present capacity of 500 locals, 20 long distance and 20 farmers' or rural lines. The ultimate capacity is to be 2,000 local, 100 long distance and 100 farmers' lines. The switchboard as manufactured is framed and wired for larger work, but the apparatus to be put into it by the local company when the switchboard is put in place will be for the smaller number of telephones, which, however, will be at least twice the capacity of the present board.

The switchboard now used is of the magneto type, with a trunking system, while the new board is to be of the multiple system. It is to be so constructed that a great deal of time of the operators will be saved in their work, by the use of automatic light signals, which will show when a line is calling or is in use. The subscriber will not have to ring central, as in the present style, but the removal of the receiver from the hook will flash a light in front of the hello lamp which will be due notice to her that someone is calling.

Mr. Robertson stated this morning that the new board will effect a saving, according to figures worked out by the telephone company, of about three-fourths of the time now used by operators in finding out if lines are busy, or if subscribers have "got their party." As it is, the girl uses about 40 per cent of her energy determining the state of the line, whereas with the new board, she will lose only 10 per cent in this direction.

MRS. JOHN SCHALLOCK IS DEAD

condition for four or five years leading up to this trouble.

Mrs. Schallock was a daughter of Judge Cranston, one of the first circuit judges in the Klamath country. She was born in the Willamette Valley 54 years ago, and came to this city, then Linkville, in 1872. About 35 years ago she was married to John Schallock, who has been connected with the sheriff's office here almost constantly since their marriage.

To this union there have been five children, three of whom have passed away. The two surviving children are Mark Schallock and a daughter, Mrs. J. Daggett, now a resident of Oak Ridge, Ore.

Mrs. Schallock had two sisters, Mrs. Fred Melhase of this city and Mrs. Sharpe of Portland. All of the relatives have been notified by wire. Mark Schallock received the message announcing the death of his mother at Chilqua this morning. He started at once for this city, and arrived about 3 o'clock this afternoon.

Mrs. Schallock was prominent in church and lodge work, and it is probable that the funeral will be held under the auspices of one of the organizations of which she was a member. No definite arrangements have yet been made.

County Clerk De Lap announced this afternoon that his office would be closed at least half of the day on which the funeral is held. It is expected that the other county officials will also close their offices during the same hours.

PAVING COMPANY GOING TO LEAVE

STRANGE-MAGUIRE PLANT ON SIXTH STREET BEING DISMAN-TLED BECAUSE CONCERN IS TO WORK ELSEWHERE

Work of dismantling the paving plant of the Strange-Maguire company on Sixth street has begun, as the company is preparing to pull up stakes in Klamath Falls, having completed all the work for which it has contracts. Within a few days the effects of the surfacing concern will be placed on cars and moved to other fields of action.

The work of finishing the patches on the streets where the company has put down bitulithic is expected to be completed today. About four miles of the pavement has been put down in Klamath Falls by the Strange-Maguire company, and there seems to be no more paving contracts in sight just now, hence the move.

WICKERSHAM IS TRUE REFORMER

ATTORNEY GENERAL DOES NOT ALLOW HIS PERSONAL BILLS TO GET MIXED UP WITH THOSE OF THE U. S. GOVERNMENT

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 16.—For careful supervision of department expenditures—careful from his standpoint—Attorney General Wickersham probably has something on most cabinet officers. It has long been the custom of government officers to make use of the little emoluments which come within their prerogatives. Thus a cabinet officer would in most cases believe himself entitled to use of the franking privilege, even when sending out personal letters. If he made a speech he would have the government printing office print it at government expense. But not so with Wickersham. If he addresses any member of his family by mail he uses a stamp which he pays for himself. If he sends out any mail matter which might under any circumstances be construed as private business, and not strictly concerned with the government's affairs, he pays for the postage. When he makes a speech and his friends send in for copies, he has it printed at his own expense.

LABORITES CANNOT AGREE

WILSON AND ROOSEVELT ARE FAVORITES OF THE EXECUTIVE COUNCIL OF AMERICAN FEDERATION OF LABOR

FARMERS' PHONE TOWARD MIDLAND

TWO MILES OF WIRE REACH TO CRISLER & STILTS RANCH, AND AN EQUAL ADDITION IS LIKELY SOON

Approximately two miles of telephone line from the city line to the Crisler & Stilts ranch, just completed, gives a farmers' telephone service that far, and Manager L. R. Robertson of the local branch of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company, announced today that he believed two more miles would be completed to Midland by the 1st of September.

The farmers themselves construct the line outside the city limits, while the telephone company puts in a link from its central station to the city limits to complete the service so that the rural population may have the advantage of telephone connection with city subscribers at will. By putting up a share of the line at their own expense the farmer population gets a cheaper toll for its facilities than it would otherwise.
