FRUIT IN THE KENO DISTRICT IS GOOD

R. W. Tower Reports Crop This Year Indicated That Grants Pass Will Have to Move Fast to Keep in Running

Fruit is doing fine in the Keno district, according to R. W. Tower, who was in the city today. The trees are bearing more fruit of larger size than ever, with quality constantly improving. Mr. Tower is a pioneer in the fruit proposition in this section, and owing to the fact that fruit was an unknown quantity when he wanted to grow some, he had to take his chances and put in what he thought would do well.
"It was eight years ago when I first started to grow fruit down there," said Mr. Tower to the Herald. "Owing to conditions, and there being no fruit, no one could tell me what to grow, and as a result I simply had to try for what I might get out of it. I have now had apples five years in succession, which is the feature of the business that pleases me most. In most parts of the country you figure on an off year, but there has been none where I am."
"Some varieties of apple tree have been in two years, or in the season after planting, and most of them develop fruit in from two to four years. The success of the experiment so far has been such that in addition to the four acres now in fruit on my place I am going to put in twenty acres more just as soon as I can clear the tract. One of the highest compliments I've heard paid to the fruit was by a man from near Grants Pass, which is in the fruit belt, who said that we have Grants Pass beaten for soil for apples, for trees, for thriftiness of the fruit and for the quality of it."
"There are some apple trees only an inch and a half in diameter carrying all the apples they will bear. In winter apples there are the McIntosh Red, Winter Banana, Wealthy, Gano, Yellow Newtown, Winesap, Oregon Red Winter, Peter, Wisner's Dessert and Iowa Blush. Fall Apples include the Yellow Transparent and Duchess of Oldenburg, a Russian variety, and there is a summer apple, the Early Colton."
"In the four-acre orchard there are besides the apples, pears, peaches, plums and cherries. The peaches are doing well, and when I put in the twenty additional acres some peaches will be planted."
"Other crops are showing up well. We cut our wheat for hay, and got two tons and better to the acre. Owing to the fact that our undertaking includes logging, we wanted the grass for feed. Others in the neighborhood will thresh the wheat they have raised and it appears to be very good."

CHURCHES QUIET, PASTORS TRAVEL

BUT BAPTISTS AND METHODISTS HOLD REGULAR MEETINGS

Summer cuts in on the usual routine of the churches the same way that it does in many other institutions of modern life, as is evidenced by the fact that tomorrow two local pulpits will have no preaching. They are those of the First Presbyterian and Episcopal Church of the Redeemer.
Rev. Henry Collins, rector of the latter church, started in the middle of the week on his horse for The Dalles country, centering informally around a special schedule of itinerancy. Rev. Stubblefield and wife left Friday with a camping party for Crater Lake and neighborhood.
At the Church of the Redeemer, while there will be no devotion tomorrow, on the Sunday following Bishop Robert L. Paddock of the diocese of Eastern Oregon, is expected to be here to occupy the pulpit on that and the subsequent Sunday. As Rev. Collins plans to return in time for services on Sunday, September 8th, the congregation will be without services but one Sabbath.
Rev. Stubblefield will be absent about a month. Before going he announced that there would be no services tomorrow, but made no definite statement regarding other Sundays that he will be away.

The union gospel meetings held in the Pavilion during the summer came to an end last Sunday evening. Tomorrow evening at Grace M. E. Church, of which Rev. George H. Pease is pastor, there will be special musical services, and at the Baptist church, Eighth and Canal streets, of which Rev. J. G. Brendel is pastor, there will be the usual services.
