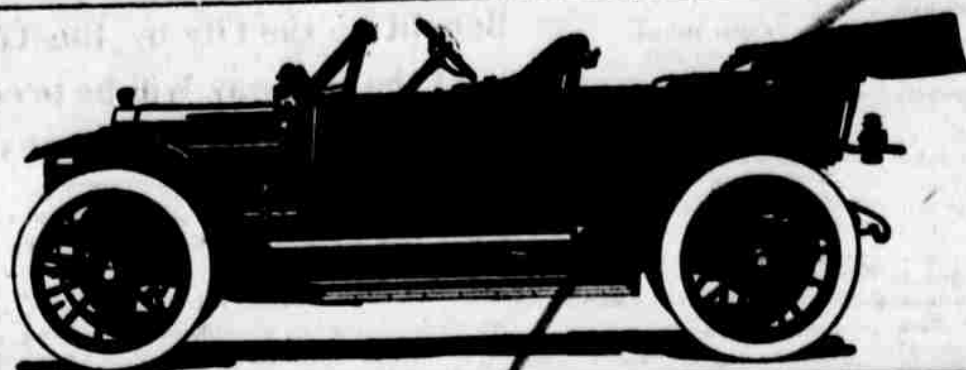

Other local institutions and business houses were closed during the afternoon, and business was practically at a standstill a good part of the day.

Services for the deceased were held at the First Presbyterian church, of which Mrs. Schallock had long been a member, at 2 o'clock this afternoon. Rev. J. S. Stubbledorf, pastor of the church, was in charge of the services, he having been summoned from his vacation trip to Crater Lake, on which he started Friday. Burial of Mrs. Schallock was in the Klamath Falls cemetery, where rest the remains of her parents, her two brothers and her two sons.

CONGRESS WILL QUIT SATURDAY

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 19.—It is expected that congress will adjourn Saturday sure. Possible vetoes by the president is the only hitch. The house is marking time, and the senate leaders are planning to rush the work.

The budget bill is the first business. If this measure is voted attempts will be made Wednesday to pass it over the veto. If this fails another budget bill minus the commerce court abolition will be passed. President Taft is as yet undecided whether or not to veto the canal bill.

POOR EXCURSION UP TO CHILOQUIN

SUNDAY OUTING OFFERED AT CHEAP RATE BY SOUTHERN PACIFIC FAILS TO ATTRACT AS MANY AS HOPED FOR

Whether enough passengers were carried on the excursion to Chiloquin Sunday to justify the Southern Pacific in holding another one seems to be an open question, and no official information on the subject could be obtained today. The special train for the thirty mile run had three coaches, of which two were fairly well filled, about 100 persons composing the excursion crowd. The rate for the trip was \$1.10, the sixty mile ride taking the excursionists through some interesting country past Upper Klamath Lake and into the district which the new Klamath Falls-Natron cutoff has made more accessible to this neighborhood.

The weather Saturday is somewhat to blame for the lack of patronage Sunday, as it was cool and chilling, which deterred many from going who would otherwise have got up Sunday morning for an early start. While the excursion day was bright and pleasant the unofficial forecast was not for desirable weather.

It is possible that if the railroad company runs another such excursion it will require a guarantee of a certain number of tickets.

BAIN CASE MAY BE DROPPED

IN SPITE OF DISTRICT ATTORNEY FREDERICK'S STATEMENT THE GENERAL BELIEF IS DARROW WILL NOT BE PROSECUTED

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 19.—The date of the second trial of Clarence Darrow on a charge of being implicated in the bribing of Juror Bain will be set this afternoon.

District Attorney Fredericks has reiterated his determination to prosecute the Bain charge, but it is generally believed that the case will be dropped.

Arguments on a motion presented by Earl Rogers to dismiss the indictments pending against Darrow will be heard by Judge Hutton at 2 o'clock Tuesday afternoon.

Rogers' ground was that the trial has not been set within the sixty-day limit prescribed by law.

STEAM ROLLER IS IN A DITCH

BIG MACHINE OWNED BY THE COUNTY BREAKS THROUGH A BRIDGE—MACHINE WILL BE ON THE JOB AGAIN SHORTLY

The giant steam roller which belongs to the county, and which has been used in rolling the county roads for the past few years, toppled over at the Adams ditch on the Henry Anderson ranch near here last Saturday afternoon, and considerable difficulty has been found in righting it back to its former position, says the Merrill Record.

While crossing the bridge, which has only four stringers under it, the roller first broke one stringer on one end and another on the other end, thus giving it a toppling position, and then turned over into the ditch. Road Supervisor Wilson is planning on having it running again in a few days.
