

PELICAN PAVING TO BE PAID FOR

COUNCIL FINDS BROAD, WALL
AND ESPLANADE PROPERLY
SURFACED, AND ENGINEER'S
FIGURES DESERVE SANCTION

After the street committee of council had reported at last night's meeting that it had examined the Warren Construction company's work in surfacing Broad, Wall and Esplanade streets, which complete a circle of bitulthie around the White Pelican inn, approved the work, and the engineer's estimate therefor, the city council ordered that the work be accepted and paid for.

LOUIS HILL PASSES UP KLAMATH TRIP

Business Calls Railroad Magnate to St. Paul. Is Represented Here by His
Prineville Representative

Louis Hill, chairman of the board of directors of the Great Northern, and advertised as the "Man Who Made the West," will not come to Klamath Falls this month. In fact he has passed up the Central Oregon Development League meeting in Lakeview, and has gone to St. Paul. J. R. Stinson, manager for the Oregon Western Colonization company in Crook and Harney counties, a concern in which Mr. Hill is heavily interested, arrived in the city last night with this information:

"Mr. Hill wired me that he had been obliged to return to St. Paul from Glacier National Park," said Mr. Stinson. "W. P. Davidson, president of our company, likewise will

be unable to attend the meeting in Lakeview."

Mr. Stinson with his wife and Dr. and Mrs. J. H. Rosenberg of Prineville, left home at 9:10 Sunday morning and arrived at Crater Lake, by auto, at 8:50 the same night. They came on to this city Monday, and left this morning for Lakeview.

"The colonization company has about 800,000 acres of land in four counties, Crook, Harney, Linn and Malheur," said Mr. Stinson. "This land we are selling rapidly. The prices range from \$5 to \$80 an acre. The price is fixed under the Hill plan of a price that will yield a profit to the farmer of 10 per cent."

"We have recently opened offices in Spokane and Seattle, and are getting very good results from our present selling campaign."

VERBIAGE EXITS FROM CITY DADS

OSCAR PEYTON'S PROPOSED
GIANT PORTABLE COAL BIN
COMES UP FOR CONSIDERA-
TION—PERMIT HELD UP

Oscar Peyton's coal bin will be investigated by the city council.

Maybe it should be called a proposed coal bin.

Or, maybe it would be better to go half way and refer to it as a coal bin partly constructed, because the owner started to build it before he knew a permit would be required from the council for its erection. When he learned about this he ceased work on it.

Last night his application for a permit came before the council and caused much verbiage to make its exit from the features of the city dads. The proposed coal bin is to be 25x16 feet, to be stored on a lot back of the Jackson building at Main and Pine streets which Peyton has leased. The bin is to be a sort of a substitute for a coal yard, and to be used for housing coal until the fuel may be needed. The reason the owner is constructing a bin, so Chief of Police Joseph Smith told the council, is that it will be portable, and he can move it if occasion requires.

Councilman Savidge thought the permit should hang pending investigation. Councilman Miles also thought the matter had better be scrutinized. The rest of the council thought likewise, so the coal bin's fate is in abeyance. Mrs. Mary Jackson, near whose building the bin has been planned to abide, is one of the leaders of the city beautiful movement.

Proposition of Actor Darrell, Which, He Says, Is Meeting With Encouragement From the Business Men He Has Met

C. J. Darrell, an actor who came to this city with the Moore-Ethier company, which disbanded here about two weeks since, has proposed a scheme for advertising this city which he says is meeting with much encouragement from business men to whom he has broached its details.

Darrell proposes a continent-wide stroll in which he will visit many cities and talk with as many people as he can about Klamath Falls, making known its rare advantages.

"All the men with whom I have talked on the proposition think it is all right," said Darrell. "If I did not think it was good I would not consider it, and if I did not have faith in Klamath Falls I would not be able to contemplate working for its interest among strangers. It takes confidence in a thing to successfully further it. If this proposition were to go through it would mean that I would make this city my home and make my investments here. The city looks good to me, and I think it has a substantial future."

Darrell's idea is to walk from this city to Ashland, Portland, Ore., Portland Me., then through New York to New Orleans and San Diego and back here. This would, in the first stretch, reverse the route of Edward Payson Weston, the patriarchal pedestrian from New England, who has twice walked across the states from Portland, Me., to Portland, Ore.

CONSIDER BILLS WHEN PRESENTED

THAT'S COURSE SUGGESTED BY
COUNCILMAN SAVIDGE, WHO
RELIEVES THE FRESHER THEY
ARE THE EASIER TO HANDLE

Sometimes when the city council meets it is confronted with bills that are not exactly fresh, and often in such instances there is debate as to whether the bill is correct, or whether it was authorized. Councilman Savidge suggested last night to the city fathers that bills be considered the first night after presentation, in other words, as soon as presented. No action was taken on his tip. Heretofore the matter has been up in council and some members have favored considering city obligations at stated meetings, the first meeting of a month being preferred, because the grist of monthly bills has always to be handled at that time, making it convenient to consider other bills at the same time.

It was largely a custom in the council of the preceding administration to refer all doubtful bills to the finance committee, of which G. W. White, then in council, was chairman. The turning of bills over to the committee was frequently the subject of a lively debate because the committee objected to having forced on it bills that it knew nothing about or whose nature was obvious.

of the city, to prevent and suppress bawdy houses or places where fornication is practiced, and to punish any inmate, keeper or frequenter thereof.

In moving to table, Councilman Doty said the old council gave the red-light people permits to build and to go in their present location, and that just as soon as they had bought property and built, or moved in houses and the paying for the improvements ceased, there was agitation which resulted in their being driven out. This was some months ago.

"I went to the late mayor, Mr. Sanderson, to get a permit to move some houses in there," said Councilman Doty. "The mayor said I did not need a permit, as the land had been set aside for them. Those people have more respect for the city in going there and staying than have those people who would drive them out of there and spread them all over the city. I move you, Mr. Mayor, that this petition be tabled indefinitely."

CALIFORNIA WILL CONTINUE HANGING

FAILURE OF PETITION TO BE
FREELY SIGNED CAUSES GOV-
ERNOR TO ORDER EXECUTION
OF SEVEN PERSONS

SACRAMENTO, Aug. 20.—Because the agitation for the abolition of the death penalty failed to enlist but a few thousand signatures to the petition, Governor Johnson announced today that all seven of the condemned men who had been reprieved from time to time because of the existence of this petition, must die.

Alexander Sinfacur and George Figueroa will be hanged September 6. The other executions will follow a week apart.
