CRATER LAKE FOLDERS FOR FREE DISTRIBUTION
Assistant Superintendent McCall, of Postoffice, Gets Them, With Letter, From Supervisor Erickson of Medford

Assistant Postmaster John A. McCall is in receipt of a letter from Supervisor M. L. Erickson of Medford, accompanied by 100 Crater Lake folders for distribution in this city. The folders are not only useful for those who visit the park, for whose use they are especially intended, but to those interested in forestry regulations and game laws, for besides a detail map of the park inside the folder, there are printed on the outside many hints about the care of timber and game, with extracts from statutes regarding them.

The printed matter also calls attention to public health regulations as they apply to hunters, campers, tourists and forest rangers. The folder says: "The timber industry has been the main contributor to development on the Pacific coast. Its revenues are shared alike by laborers, farmers, merchants, artisans and professional men. If the timber were burned up many industries would be destroyed and all citizens would suffer."

"The lumber industry is, and, if the timber industry is protected, will long be, the biggest industry on the Pacific coast. At present it produces each year a revenue to the community of \$125,000,000. In this same region, timber that yields, at the same rate, a revenue amounting to \$40,000,000 is destroyed annually by fire."

"This injury is as widespread as it is unnecessary. Even if you don't own a stick of timber you are interested in the outcome derived from its manufacture. Almost all of the money received from the lumber industry goes to pay for labor and supplies in the state in which the timber grew. On every thousand feet burned the public bears over 50 per cent of the loss. All the owner loses is the stumpage value."

Following this are suggestions as to "How You Can Help."
In the game data is the following: "It will be appreciated if you will report violations of game laws to William L. Finley, state game warden, 808 Yeon building, Portland, Ore. Copies of game laws will be sent free upon application to his office."

SAVES RELATIVE; NOW HE'S SORRY
MECHANIC JUMPS INTO STREAM IN ANSWER TO CRIES AND FINDS IT IS HIS MOTHER-IN-LAW HE HAS SAVED

GENEVA, Aug. 21.—While returning home from work along the bank of the Rhone, at Bellegarde, a young mechanic named Dubois heard cries of distress, and seeing a woman struggling in the stream he plunged in and started to tow her to safety. Just as his feet touched bottom, Dubois discovered to his disgust that he had saved his mother-in-law, with whom he had been on bad terms for some time. He promptly threw her out into the water again, and walked away swearing.
Fortunately at this juncture a boatman who had put out into the river, picked up the woman, who otherwise would have been drowned. The mother-in-law has decided not to prosecute Dubois.

CITIZENS TO ASK GOVERNOR'S PROBE

It was ascertained last night that Governor West has been asked to investigate municipal matters in Klamath Falls.
Citizens who have been dissatisfied with the conduct of local affairs by the present city council, spurred on by the disclosures of graft and the failure of the council to shut up the red light district, are said to be behind the movement.
Recently Governor West has taken an active part in municipal house cleanings, and this is the basis for the hope of those interested that he will look over the Klamath Falls field.
On the governor's recent trip to Eastern Oregon he stirred up things in Huntington and in Redmond. The end is not yet in the Redmond affair. The governor has declared that unless the mayor of the town quits he will declare martial law and take possession of the place at the head of a company of militia.
Latest reports from Portland are to the effect that troops are in readiness to start for Redmond on an hour's notice.
In the meantime, the resignation of the mayor is in the hands of the city council, but the members of that body are not inclined to accept it, claiming that the governor does not understand the true facts.
The mayor was recently convicted of gambling, but it is claimed that he was "railroaded." It is said that the judge before whom he was tried was notoriously against him, and that the mayor was not given time within which to secure the attendance of important witnesses.

ROYAL CHEF IS KEPT WATCHED

FEAR OF POISON STIRS WORKERS IN THE Czar's KITCHEN TO ACTIVITY—SALARY IS AMPLIFIED FOR MANY YEARS

ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 21.—Journalistic investigations in the royal kitchens have revealed the fact that the czar's chef gets a salary of \$18,000 a year. His imperial master is not an epicure, and prefers simple dishes, but the chef has by no means an easy time. In addition to the imperial family he has to provide for the 200 inmates of the palace, but his great trouble is to see that poisons are not introduced into the dishes intended for the czar's table. Many of his kitchen hands are secret service men, who are continually spying on him and on each other.
