BIDS ARE OPEN FOR SECOND UNIT

SOME FIRM FIGURES ON ALL SCHEDULES OR NONE—SEEMS SO LOW THAT NO OTHER SINGLE FIRM OR COMBINATION CAN BEAT IT

Bids were opened Tuesday at the office of Project Engineer W. W. Patch, of the reclamation service, for construction of parts of the second unit, which is to furnish water for irrigation purposes to about 6500 acres of land, most of which is in Poe Valley. The work is divided, the digging to be of four main laterals, the North Poe Valley, South Poe Valley, Nuss aka and Griffith.

For the contractors to bid, either on parts or all the work, it was divided into seven portions of excavation, shown by the following schedules:

- No. 1.—North Poe Valley, 40,450 cubic yards.
- No. 2.—North Poe Valley, including tributary sub-laterals, 36,200 cubic yards.
- No. 3.—South Poe Valley, 53,100 cubic yards.
- No. 4.—South Poe Valley, including tributary sub-laterals, 77,600 cubic yards.
- No. 5.—Nuss aka, 31,100 cubic yards.
- No. 6.—Griffith, including tributary sub-laterals, 23,400 cubic yards.
- No. 7.—Griffith, 23,300 cubic yards.

The lowest bid for all the schedules was that of Maney Bros. & Co., Boise, Idaho, who offer to do the entire work, but no single schedule. Their bid was \$67,512.50, and this figure could not be competed with by any other combination of single schedule bids or otherwise.

Next to the foregoing bid was that of William H. Mason, Klamath Falls, all or none, \$76,697.50.

Third best for all schedules was the bid of Elmore & Elliott of Seattle, who want five or more schedules, their bid for all seven being \$59,250.

For 1, 2, 4 and 5, all or none, Mason bid \$46,532.50.

For 4 and 5, both, or No. 4, but not No. 5, Mason bid \$21,655.

The Bernay Construction Co., of Lakeview, bid for 1, 2, 3 and 4, \$32,475.50.

J. A. Maddox, Klamath Falls, on 7, bid \$4,570.

Roberts Bros. and J. O. Swindler, Donama, on 2 and 4, \$20,890.

C. B. Clendenning, Klamath Falls, on 6 and 7, \$12,915.

Walton & Wynkoop, Klamath Falls, on 4 and 7, bid \$20,152.50.

J. B. Griffith, Klamath Falls, on 4, bid \$7,310.

The bids will be forwarded to Washington, and if the bid of Maney Bros. & Co. is approved the contract will be awarded to them.

The work must commence within thirty-five days after the execution of the contract on the part of the United States, 10 per cent must be done before December 1, 1913, 50 percent before July 1, 1913, and all by November 1, 1913.

HEAVIER RAILS ON LINE TO WEED

SIXTY-POUND STEEL IS BEING REPLACED WITH 80-POUND WHICH, WHEN TAKEN UP, BOLD TO ALGOMA LUMBER CO.

Although the Southern Pacific line between Weed and this city has been open but two years, the company has already renewed the track, replacing the 60-pound steel rails first laid with 80-pound rails. This is regarded as a significant index of the company's policy to keep up to date and have the line maintained in the best possible condition. Traffic on the branch from Weed kept up very well from the time of the opening of the line, and has been especially heavy during the warm seasons. With the extension of the line to Chiloquin there was an added demand on the facilities and strength of the Weed-Klamath Falls line, so that it has been kept pretty busy meeting the demands of the traffic. It is in prime condition now, with its rock ballast and 80-pound rails, and trains coming over it ride as smoothly as they do on the main line. In fact, the line from Weed will be a part of the ultimate main line when the cut-off via Klamath Falls and Natron is completed.

Much of the 60-pound steel removed from the local division has been sold, and last night at 8:25 o'clock there arrived a work train with a consignment of rails which it had picked up during the day along the road to be delivered to the Algoma Lumber company on its extension from the mill at Algoma to the woods. Part of the rails for this work were brought by the lumber company from Pokagama off the old Pokagama logging road, when the mill was removed from Pokagama to Algoma.

All told, the lumber company has bought nearly three miles of 60-pound rails from the Southern Pacific company, the purchases to date aggregating 14,000 feet.

All horses must be entered on previous day. All riders in bucking contest must be entered before contest begins. No fee.

The judges will pick the worst bucking horses from the wild horse race each day, and on the last day these horses will run final wild horse race.
