BIG SPUD CROP IS ANTICIPATED

CHAS. DE LAP'S TWENTY ACRES IN "MURPHIES" EXPECTED TO PRODUCE ABOUT 8,000 BUSHELS OF MEALY VEGETABLES

Deputy County Clerk Charles De Lap expects a splendid yield of "spuds" this year off his land nine miles east of town on the Merrill road. The land is just opposite the famous Henley ranch. The farm, which last year was in charge of Robert Short, is this year being conducted by David L. Rightmeyer, and the twenty acres in which tubers are planted are expected to give about 150 bushels each, or a total of 3,000 bushels. There was a very good yield last year, about the same as is expected this year. At that time one acre produced 173 bushels. Potatoes are now selling at 40 per 100 pounds, and De Lap will hold this year's crop for a rise. Many people expect "Murphies" to be worth 1 1/2 cents a pound by spring, or twice as much as the present market price.

ARCHBOLD WILL SUE ROOSEVELT

STANDARD OIL CHIEF RESISTS STATEMENT OF COLONEL

Libel Suit is Now in the Hands of the Chief Counsel for the Standard Oil Company—Notorious Trust Senator From Idaho, Starts One-Man Fight to Stop and Prevent Investigation

NEW YORK, Aug. 24.—John Archbold of the Standard Oil company called for Europe today, after intimating that suit would be started by him against Colonel Theodore Roosevelt.

Mr. Archbold issued a statement in which he gave the first intimation of a suit against the leader of the Bull Moose.

"I am not a liar," said Mr. Archbold, in his statement, "and I am not accustomed to being so accused. I shall not endure it lightly."

Asked if he meant to sue Roosevelt for libel, Mr. Archbold said: "I mean something to that effect." The Standard Oil chief stated that M. P. Elliott, chief counsel of the Standard Oil company, would have charge of the case, and that nothing would be done until the return of Mr. Archbold from Europe.

Hayburn is Afloat

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 24.—Just when the senate was about to agree on a resolution of investigation which would open up whatever Standard Oil taint there might have been in the campaign of 1904, and thereby throw light on the charges that certain legislators received money gifts from the oil trust, Senator Hayburn of Idaho started a one-man filibuster.

Senators Penrose and Poindexter had framed a resolution authorizing the Clapp committee to probe the charges voiced on the floor, and before the Clapp committee.

Hayburn objected, declaring that the senate should not open up the sewers of political contests. He retained the floor despite the efforts to dislodge him. It was apparent that he hoped to force an adjournment without adopting the resolution.
