HEALTH RULES ARE TOLD BY SOCIETY

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 24.—
The Association for the Prevention
of Tuberculosis has just issued a one-
syllable compilation of rules for
health. Primarily the rules are to be
used in connection with a campaign
against the White Plague, but they
cover simple precautionary measures
against all diseases. The list will
shortly be printed on cards and dis-
tributed through tenement districts.

The "Health Rules" are as follows:
Good Air—Avoid badly ventilated,
badly lighted, dusty, dirty, over-heated
or damp rooms.

Avoid House Dust—Breathing dust
—notably house dust—often causes
disease. Have no latched-down car-
pets and matings. Have floors frequently
out of doors. Use a hair broom for
your floors and keep lower sashes
closed while sweeping or dusting.

Pure Water—Drink pure water.
Avoid water from shallow and un-
protected wells and from ponds and
streams. If in doubt, boil the water.
Avoid public drinking cups.

Safe Milk—Tuberculosis, typhoid
fever and other diseases are often
caused by drinking raw milk and raw
cream. Get milk properly pasteurized,
or home pasteurize it, or simply
scald it. All cream, including
that used for ice cream and butter,
should be properly pasteurized to be
safe.

Keep Clean—Take a bath or
sponge bath daily, and a warm bath.

followed by a cold splash, plunge or
shower, once or twice a week or
often. Use soap freely. Wash your
hands before handling food. Don't put
your fingers, money, paper or
pencils in your mouth. Clean your teeth
morning and evening.

Food—Don't eat raw food that was
exposed to flies or dust, or touched
by unclean hands. Fruit or vegeta-
bles so exposed should first be rinsed
or washed thoroughly. Chew your
food well.

Sleep—Get enough sleep. Sleep
with windows open, or, better still,
out of doors.

Head Up—Sit or stand erect. Prac-
tice deep breathing. Breathe through
your nose.

Exercise—Take plenty of outdoor
exercise, but avoid excess in athletics.
It may cause heart trouble. Don't
eat or drink when over-heated by ex-
ercise.

Liquor and Tobacco—Avoid liquor
and tobacco. They are especially in-
jurious to the young.

Don't Neglect Colds—Don't neg-
lect coughs or colds. If you do not
get well soon, go to a doctor or dis-
pensary for treatment. Never cough,
sneeze or breathe into another's face.
Don't spit on the floors and side-
walks.

Sunshine—Admit plenty of sun-
shine into your houses, and into your
lives. Cultivate cheerfulness and
kindliness, it will help you to resist
disease. Your mind acts on your
body.

DID PASTOR FISH ON SABBATH DAY

**IF STORY ABOUT REV. CHARLES
F. AKED IS TRUE—FORMER OC-
CUPANT OF ROCKEFELLER'S
PULPIT AGGRIEVED BY STORY**

Whether Rev. Charles F. Ake
really fished on last Sabbath or not is
not to be verified in this city, from the
reverend gentleman himself. But
that the reverend's ire was stirred to
its zenith by the publication of the
story in the Sacramento Union under
a Klamath Falls date line. A report-
er who got the reverend on the tele-
phone to ask as to the truth of such
an eminent divine taking his rod and
line out on the holy Sabbath, in the
high hope of annexing a few trout
certainly got no denial or affirmation
of the story.

Rev. Ake said that he had no
statement to make, one way or the
other, and the way in which he said
it left no doubt as to the fact that he
was irritated more completely than is
often the case.

It's the prominence of this domi-
nant makes the story so interest-
ing, and while it is certainly a fish
story in one sense of the word, in that
it concerns a fish, whether it is a fish
story as far as concerns its veracity
is in doubt.

Rev. Ake was very prominent as
a clergyman when he had a pulpit in
the British Isles, and when he took
the John D. Rockefeller church in
New York it caused quite a stir. But
when he left that church to take a
San Francisco church it caused a big-
ger stir, for it was commonly reported
that he felt his sphere of action in
the Rockefeller congregation was too
limited, and that there were too many
"dry bones" in the church to make
his evangelistic aspirations possible.

Captain O. C. Applegate and fam-
ily have returned from a several

legate had charge of the reserva-
tion for the government.

ATH PASS THROUGH THE CITY
EN ROUTE HOME FROM THE
LAKEVIEW MEETING**

The Fort Klamath delegation to
the Lakeview meeting stopped off in
Klamath Falls last night. John Ellis,
James Pelton, L. C. Sisemore and
others were included in the party
from the Wood River Valley town,
and they were tireless in their efforts
to herald the advantages of their sec-
tion.

Concerning their efforts in Lake-
view, the Lake County Examiner has
the following to say:

"They have neatly printed badges,
the badge being green, with gold
printing, which is emblematic of their
fine pastures and golden sunsets, be-
sides a large banner which they
stretched across the street. Their
section is particularly well adapted to
dairying, the industry having made a
remarkable growth during the past
year. A modern creamery has just
been completed, and the first roll of
butter was sold for \$26.40. The town
of Fort Klamath is but a few miles
from Crater Lake, and on account of
its location is becoming noted as a
summer resort, many tourists making
it headquarters while visiting points
of interest in the neighborhood."
