BISHOP PADDOCK GOES TOMORROW

MISSIONARY CLERGYMAN STAYS
HERE BUT ONE SUNDAY, CON-
DUCTING SERVICES FOR THE
CHURCH OF THE REDEEMER

Right Rev. Robert L. Paddock, D.
D., missionary bishop of the Episco-
pal church, who has while here been
the guest of Mr. and Mrs. J. C.
Brockenbrough, conducted services at
the Church of the Redeemer Sunday
morning in the absence of the rector,
Rev. Henry C. Collins. Bishop Pad-
dock expects to leave tomorrow morn-
ing for Fort Klamath, where he plans
to hold services Wednesday evening.
From there he will go to Prineville
and Bend. The congregation, as well
as other friends of the bishop, had
believed his stay here would last two
or three Sundays, and regret the need
for him to curtail his stay.

PHYSICIANS DO NOT LIKE NOISE

MEETING IN BOSTON PLACES ON
RECORD FORMAL OBJECTION.
AUTO HORNS ARE ESPECIALLY
AIMED AT

BOSTON, Aug. 26.—More than
500 prominent physicians from all
parts of the world are assembled this
week at the International Otological
congress.

One of the principal meetings was
devoted to the suppression of the
noise evil. The opening address was
delivered by Dr. Clarence John Blake
of the Harvard medical school and the
president of the congress. Dr.
Blake discussed the question of noise
from the standpoint of its deleterious
effect upon the human ear. He cited
locksmiths, blacksmiths, mechanics,
iron turners, boiler makers, engineers
and stokers, as well as persons work-
ing in machine shops. He showed
the effect of their surroundings as
diminishing their hearing power.

"The multitudinous noises of the
street," said Dr. Blake, "with their
disharmonious and metallic over-
tones, together with the subjection of
the ear to such prolonged, shrill notes
as are incident to railway and factory
whistles, are also productive of aural
defects, although in a lesser degree
than where the impairment of the
hearing is the direct result of occupa-
tion and exposure."

OREGON IS SHORT IN MINERAL OUTPUT

The value of the mine production
of gold, silver and copper in Oregon
in 1911, according to Charles G. Yale
of the United States geological sur-
vey, was \$669,016, against \$700,676
in 1910. No output of lead or zinc
was reported either in 1910 or 1911.
The ore (and tailings) treated in
1911 was 94,363 short tons, against
82,132 short tons in 1910. The tail-
ings treated in 1911 amounted to
44,846 tons, against 12,142 tons in
1909, so that the increased total ton-
nage treated in 1911 was not due to a
larger production of crude ore. The
production of gold decreased from
\$679,455 in 1910 to \$633,407 in
1911. Gold output from deep mines
decreased \$43,430, and that from
placer mines decreased \$2,651, com-
pared with the output of 1910.

The production of silver increased
from 39,978 fine ounces, valued at
\$19,428, in 1910, to 45,321 ounces,
valued at \$23,967, in 1911. Of the
silver 34,011 fine ounces was derived
from siliceous ores, 9,955 ounces from
copper ores, and the rest from placer
mines. The copper ore shipped to
smelters amounted to 4,205 tons,
having a copper content of 23.136
pounds, valued at \$11,642. This in-
dicates an average recovery of 22.2
pounds of copper per ton. The aver-

age recovery of gold and silver from
copper ores was \$3.32 per ton.

Baker county led in gold produc-
tion, with an output of \$389,786, of
which \$372,405 was derived from
74,558 tons of siliceous ore and from
tailings. Josephine county produced
\$99,362 in gold, of which \$86,567
came from placer mines. Of the sil-
ver production of 45,321 ounces, over
two-thirds came from Baker county.
Copper ores yielded the greater part
of the 10,436 ounces of silver credited
to Josephine county, which also
produced about 90 per cent of the
1911 output of copper in Oregon.

The combined output of gold from
Southwestern Oregon in 1911 was
\$188,971, of which \$123,008 was
placer gold. The placer gold produc-
tion of this region decreased \$7,095
and the deep mine output decreased
\$13,358. The mines of Northeastern
Oregon produced \$444,436 in gold in
1911, of which the placer yield was
\$45,366, and the deep mine yield
\$399,170. The placers of this region
showed an increase of \$4,444, and
the deep mines a decrease of \$30,172.

There were forty deep mines and
134 placer mines operated in Oregon
in 1911. Of the placer mines 88 were
hydraulic, three dredging, nine drift-
ing, and 26 sluicing properties.

Judges in the city beautiful contest
for the finest lawn have been chosen
as follows: Mrs. L. F. Williams, Mrs.
J. P. Lee, Mrs. George I. Wright, Mr.
Elmer Applegate and Prof. Max A.
McCall, instructor in agriculture in
the city and county schools. Prof.
McCall, who is an expert in such mat-
ters, is preparing a schedule of points
which will be followed by the com-
mittee of judges in awarding the
prizes.

One of the largest, greenest and
generally best kept lawns in the city
is that of Mr. and Mrs. John C. Broc-
kenbrough, in the Hot Springs addi-
tion. This lawn, while urged as a
probable prize winner if entered in
the contest, will not be among those
submitted to the judges. Mrs. Broc-
kenbrough has declined to enter it
for the reason that she is the vice
president of the movement.

In the meantime it stands as an
encouraging model to others who
have yards and want pretty ones.
