PIONEER NEVER LEFT THE STATE

JOHN SMITH OF BENTON COUNTY DIES AFTER ILLNESS OF A YEAR—WAS PROUD OF HIS LONG RESIDENCE IN OREGON

CORVALLIS, Aug. 27.—John Smith, a native of Benton county, died at his home in Corvallis the other day.

Mr. Smith was born November 19, 1850, and was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Greenberry Smith, prominent pioneers. He has resided in this county all of his life. He followed farming and stock raising, and was an extensive holder of farm lands. His friends and acquaintances of the state and of Benton county in particular are numerous. For several years Mr. Smith had been failing in health, and about a year ago he suffered a stroke of paralysis, since then being confined to the house.

Mr. Smith was proud of the fact that he had never been out of the state of Oregon, and it is said that when asked why he did not take a trip and see the world he replied: "I don't believe there is any country better to look at than this is. I do not believe any country could be better. It suits me, and I don't care to look at anything else."

BLIND MAN MAY REGAIN SIGHT

PLAN IS TO TRANSFER EYES OF HANGED MAN TO AFFLICTED CITIZEN—GOVERNOR IS PETITIONED TO PERMIT OPERATION

DENVER, Aug. 27.—If the strange request of William J. Abrams, a blind man of Denver, is granted by the state authorities, and consent to one of the most remarkable operations known to medical science is given by Lewis J. Wechter, condemned to die in the state penitentiary at Canon City next week, Abrams will look through the eyes of a murderer the rest of his life, provided the proposed operation is successful.

Abrams has forwarded his petition to Governor John F. Shafroth, Warden Thomas J. Tinnin of the state penitentiary and to Wechter, condemned to die on the scaffold for the murder of Clifford J. Burrows in Denver last year. His petition is supplemented by a statement from a Denver physician who, after an examination of Abrams' eyes, declares that the operation can be performed successfully.

If Abrams' request is granted the physician and surgeons will be in the death chamber when the trap is sprung. Immediately after Wechter has been officially pronounced dead the eyes will be removed before the removal of the body from the death chamber. They will be placed in a saline solution, after which the surgeons will rush to a hospital near by where the cornea from Wechter's eyes will be grafted into the sightless eyes of Abrams.
