

SHEPHERD IS A BUNCO VICTIM

OREGON WORKER, LOOKING FOR A SOFT JOB, LOSES \$1,500 IN REAL MONEY—TWO MEN DO THE JOB

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 27.—John Marchand, a shepherd from Oregon, complained to the police that he had been victimized out of \$1,500, his life savings, by two bunco men.

The men met Marchand, and after they bought him several drinks one represented that he was a philanthropist, and had \$10,000 he wished to distribute to the poor. He said he wanted to find some good, honest man to take charge of the fund who could show that he was responsible. Marchand liked the idea of the job, and took the men to the French bank and drew out his \$1,500 to show he had money.

The money was placed in a brown valise along with the \$10,000 fund and Marchand was given the possession of the bag. They visited several places and finally the men left him. Last night Marchand opened the valise to see that the money was all safe, and found nothing but a piece of gaspipe and other metal.

YOUNG PEOPLE TO TAKE TRIP

MOONLIGHT EXCURSION WILL LEAVE THIS CITY TONIGHT. THE WINKMA HAS BEEN CHARTERED FOR THE OCCASION

VITAL STATISTICS ISSUED BY STATE BOARD IN FAVORABLE FOR SECTION—THIRTEEN MARRIAGES AND SIX BIRTHS

According to the report of the Oregon State Board of Health, the vital statistics for Klamath county for the month of June, 1912, were as follows:

Births—Male 4, female 3.
Deaths—Male 3, female 1.
Tuberculosis—Deaths 1.

No deaths occurred here from typhoid fever, scarlet fever, measles, smallpox or other infectious diseases. Thirteen marriages occurred in the county during the month.

Chance for Somebody to Make \$10 on Woman Who Rides Horse in Male Attire and Stir Up Attention of Police

Somebody can make \$10 at the Sparks theater tonight, according to the word passed around on the street by a woman on horseback, carrying a banner inscribed: "Arrested in Klamath Falls. Identify me at the Sparks theater tonight, and get \$10."

The woman was dressed in much the same masculine style as she was when arrested yesterday, and her course down Main street was the cause of considerable comment.

To earn the \$10 the person picking the woman out in the audience tonight must approach her and say: "Are you the lady that was arrested in Klamath Falls and was to appear at this theater tonight?"

It will be necessary, so the management of the house says, for the person to memorize the words and speak them correctly in order to win the money. If the woman is greeted with the proper salutation she will immediately admit her individuality and the winner of the money will be paid at once.

The mysterious rider told The Herald this afternoon that her appearance at the Sparks theater tonight would be in male attire.

"I'm not going there in any mountain-climbing costume nor any other such imitation of the real clothing of a man," she declared. "I am going to wear regular masculine attire, and I defy the police to interfere with me or arrest me. I feel positive that I have a right to wear men's clothes in Klamath Falls without official molestation. I am going to see whether the police can undertake any unwarranted interference with me and make good with it. You wait until tonight and you'll see what happens."

TERROR REIGNS IN VALLEY CITIES

MURDER OF LITTLE GIRL IN EUGENE IS FOLLOWED BY ATTEMPTS OF UNKNOWN MEN TO ENTER HOUSES

EUGENE, Aug. 27.—Excitement over the recent murder of little Mildred Green by an unknown fiend does not seem to subside here. In fact, it seems to increase on account of at least two attempts by some unknown man to effect an entrance to residences in the immediate vicinity of the murder in the dead of the night.

The night after the crime a man was seen trying to get through a window in the residence of George Johnson, a block west of the Green residence, where a domestic was asleep. He was frightened away by her screams.

Saturday night the home of D. M. Purkerson, a block east of the Green residence, some one was heard tampering with the screen over the window occupied by two daughters of Purkerson. Their father heard their screams, and running to the window with a shotgun saw a man crouching beneath the window. As the man ran across the lawn he shot at him and he fell to the ground, possibly wounded, but escaped.
