WILKINS' GARDEN IS THRIFTY ONE

COLONEL PLANTS VEGETABLES LATE AT NEW DOMICILE, BUT IS REWARDED BY GOOD SHOWING—PINE ST. WHEAT PATCH

Col. M. G. Wilkins has one of the thriving gardens of the city which is another testimonial to the productivity of the soil of Klamath Falls and vicinity. He recently moved from his long-time location at Main and 11th River to Bush street, near Ninth. Here he has a much larger lot, the dimensions being about 65x120. Being a lover of flowers and practically everything else that grows, he decided to embark in a little gardening work. The back of the lot furnished a fine area for the undertaking, and although the start was made late, about two months ago, Colonel Wilkins has some fine corn, cabbage, beans and other items that will later go to help out the variety on the family bill of fare. The colonel is decidedly pleased, and justly, of what his garden has turned out to be.

One of the most attractive exhibits of an agricultural nature in this city this season has but recently been cut for the crop. This was a fine, small stand of wheat at 533 Pine street. The lot is probably 25 feet wide, and part of this in front, where the crop was, was taken up by the walk into the house. The wheat grew to a fine maturity, and was but a few days ago cut down and removed from the area, probably 18x18 feet, which it covered. The sight of a plot of fully developed patch of wheat on one of the principal residence streets of the city was a novel one.

CHEESE MYSTERY AT LAST SOLVED

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 28.—The department of agriculture has solved the mystery of holes in cheese. The solution is embodied in a most little scientific treatise just issued, bearing the title, "The Cause of Emmental Cheese."

Emmental cheese, be it known, covers the Schweitzer, or Swiss variety, that has "eyes" or holes running through it. The holes really make the cheese, because it is by their spacing and number that the experts classify the cheese as good or bad.

"The so-called eyes in Swiss cheese are its most prominent characteristics," the department sharks declare in the booklet. "Its commercial value is largely dependent upon the proper size and spacing of these eyes. While the hole is not the whole of it, much depreciation in value of this popular variety of cheese is known to exist because of defects in eye formation. Hence, to the biological chemist, the formation is a fascinating subject and to the cheese maker a matter of great importance."

The eyes are caused by chemical changes in the cheese. They are "pockets" formed by gases generated in the "ripening" process. In the emmental types, these gases are carbon dioxide and nitrogen.

PUPILS MAY EARN OWN EDUCATION

The County High School will open September 9th, and inquiries are coming in from out-of-town students who want to earn part or all of their board by doing work out of school hours. Places of this kind are not as plentiful here as in many communities, and are especially hard to find for high school boys.

In some instances this affords the only means for these young people to receive an education, and means a great deal to them as well as to the community. The High School would like to assist in getting places for such as need them, and would like the co-operation of the people of Klamath Falls in the work.

If there are any so situated that they can offer such assistance a line addressed to the High School or telephone call to W. E. Faught at his residence will bring the matter to the attention of the school, and an attempt will be made to find the proper party to fill the place.

ACTIVITY IN OREGON TIMBER

A NUMBER OF BIG SALES HAVE BEEN MADE DURING THE PAST FEW WEEKS AND SITUATION IS EXCELLENT

During the past few weeks there has been unusual activity in timber lands in Oregon. It is estimated that between \$5,000,000 and \$6,000,000 has been invested in Oregon timber, the larger part being Eastern capital.

The Crossett Timber company has taken over a large tract in Clatsop county from the Blodgett company, limited, for a consideration said to be approximately \$1,500,000. An immense tract of timber in Tillamook county is being negotiated for by a Louisiana syndicate of timbermen. This deal involves a consideration of over \$2,000,000.

The Wheeler Timber company has purchased a large body of timber in Lane county from the Booth-Kelly Lumber company. The consideration was not announced, but is understood to be about \$1,000,000. Porter Bros., railroad contractors, with headquarters in Portland, have added 250,000,000 to their already large holdings in the Siuslaw district. This deal involved a consideration of about \$250,000.

Another large deal that is under way involves the purchase of several thousand acres of yellow pine timber in Central Oregon. The tract is being taken over by Seattle capitalists.
