BOURNE SILENT AS TO PLANS

DOES NOT STATE WHETHER OR NOT HE WILL BE A CANDIDATE FOR ANOTHER TERM IN THE UNITED STATES SENATE

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 30.—United States Senator Bourne will remain here this week attending to preliminary work in connection with good roads, parcels post and rates postage features of the postoffice appropriation bill.

On Sunday he expects to start for Oregon, and probably will remain there during the campaign. Bourne will not discuss at this time the movement of his friends to have him become an independent candidate for senator.

In addition to postal matters, Bourne will take up river and harbor improvements in which Oregon is interested, and to be included in the next rivers and harbors bill. Possibly on account of this work he will not reach Oregon before September 15th.

LAKEVIEW HAS A LADY STAGE DRIVER

Lakeview claims the only woman auto stage driver in Oregon on a regular route, in the person of Mrs. Fred Melasner, who drives a car between Lakeview and New Pine Creek, a distance of fifteen miles, on the Oregon-California state line. Up to a few weeks ago the route was covered by Mr. Melasner, but he got into trouble and is awaiting trial in the county jail.

The bread winner being taken from the home, Mrs. Melasner appeared at the wheel of her car the next day, and announced that she was going to handle the run until her husband returned to duty. Though not weighing over 100 pounds, she takes her place each day, some times making several round trips, asking nothing more of the public than an even break on the business of the territory.

Mrs. Melasner came from a family that is engaged in the auto business and early learned to drive. While she has not had much experience in making repairs, a little thing like changing a tire on route does not trouble her.

Miss Fletcher registered at the Hall, but neglected to state that she was a teacher or that she wanted to go to Lakeview.

Last night a Lakeview auto arrived in the city and was to start back this morning. The driver was informed that there were two school teachers to accompany him on the return trip. Miss Williams was located, and it was at first thought that Miss Ayres was the second passenger, but she declined to make the trip to Lakeview, especially as her school appointment is in Merrill.

For a couple of hours the city was searched for a second school teacher who wanted to go to Lakeview, but without result. Less than ten minutes after the big car started for Lakeview with a single passenger, Miss Fletcher appeared on the scene. It was too late to go East, so she will visit in Klamath Falls until tomorrow morning.

STOWAWAY WHO WANTED TO GO TO CHINA AND PREACH TO THE NATIVES IS RETURNED TO SAN FRANCISCO

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 30.—Harold Yates, a youth who beheld a vision and started for the Orient to preach to the Chinese, was brought back to San Francisco on the steamer Nile, which reached here Wednesday. BOSTON, Aug. 30.—William M. Wood, president of the American Woolen company, surrendered to the police today on an indictment charging conspiracy. He went to the police headquarters with Congressman Samuel Powers, who will probably act as his counsel.

Inspector Lynch read Wood the indictment charging conspiracy in connection with the plotting to dynamite the houses of foreigners in Lawrence for the alleged purpose of injuring the cause of the strikers last winter. Wood was immediately arraigned and released on \$5,000 bond.
