CARELESS WRITERS BOTHER DELIVERY

"People cannot be too particular
about having their mail correctly ad-
dressed," said Postmaster Clyde K.
Brandenburg this morning. "We
are often taken to task by patrons of
the office for errors resulting from a
duplication of names, when it is not
up to us at all. Nobody is exempt
from mistakes in mail transit, for I've
had mail fail to reach me, and finally
located it here in the postoffice—gone
wrong."

"A man came up to the window the
other day and asked for mail for
'Joe Smith.'"
"I said, in a joking way, 'You don't
expect to get any, do you?' He
smiled and asked me if there was an-
other Joe Smith here. I told him
there were two of them. How are we
going to distinguish in such cases?"

We cannot tell from the appearance
of a letter which Joe Smith it is for.
"We had a letter come here one
day addressed to 'Mrs. Smith, care
Mr. Smith.' Not much chance in
that case for avoiding a mistake. In
order to be prepared against any
such contingency people whose names
are common or duplicated should be
sure to have some distinguishing
mark put on their mail. The busi-
ness they are in or the person they
are employed by, or their street ad-
dress, or something of that kind
would serve. Well known business
people in town here never have any
trouble with their mail mixing up, at
least we do not know of any. This
is because they are at pains to see
that it is directed to them in a way
that will avoid it being mixed up
with other people's."
