CLIFF REGAN IS MUCH SOUGHT

CALIFORNIA SHERIFFS ARE HURRYING TO IDENTIFY PRISONER HELD IN THE KLAMATH COUNTY JAIL

Sheriff William R. Barnes last night received a telegram from Bieber, Calif., saying that Sheriff Hulsinger of Lassen, Calif., would be here this evening to take a look at the supposed Cliff Regan, the man whom the sheriff arrested on suspicion of being wanted for stealing horses in California. The prisoner claims his name is Wilbur, and disavows his guilt of any thievery of any kind.

Sheriff Charles A. Collins of Inyo county, and Sheriff C. P. Ferrell of Washoe county have each wired here to have the prisoner held until they can come and get a glimpse of him, so they are expected at any time.

Sheriff Collins offers \$200, and Sheriff Ferrell \$50 for the right man, who stole a horse and saddle July 19, according to a reward circular. Deputy Sheriff John G. Schallack believes that the man arrested is wanted for something more serious than horse-stealing, owing to the great interest so many sheriffs are taking in the case.

The man wanted, Cliff Regan, has a number of aliases, among which are Pat Russell, George Davis, C. W. Regan and Frank Moore.

bullet so that at 100 yards the blow is 2000 pounds. It flattens the bullet out to the size of half a dollar very often.

"Last year I saw some bear tracks in the Diamond Lake country, but they were not as large as the big ones I saw this week."

Captain Applegate said that Colonel Roosevelt and other eminent bear chasers to the contrary notwithstanding, the cinnamon bear will follow a man in the woods, as he has had the experience of being followed by them, and apparently not in a friendly spirit at that. He believes the bears about the Haynes homestead are of the cinnamon variety, as the size is apparently between that of the black and the grizzly. But, according to the captain, the cinnamon is more ferocious, despite his intermediate size.

The reports of bear in the woods in this section of the country will be very interesting news to hunters, for the bear is a hard animal to find any trace of these days. The ones seen by Mr. Haynes had probably been foraging for ants, of which they are very fond. He reports having seen logs 40 feet long and two feet in diameter apparently moved twenty feet by hungry bears who were trying to get ants. The bear often hangs around logging locations to dig in logs and stumps for the ant, which is to him one of the finest delicacies the market affords. The bears often dig holes in the stumps of large trees sufficient in size to admit a man's body.

POSTAL RULES CAUSE FRICTION

STAGES ARE NOT ALLOWED TO DELIVER MAIL WITHIN MILE OF POSTOFFICE — MERRILL PEOPLE AFFECTED

Postmaster Clyde K. Brandenburg has his troubles, and one of the latest is over the rule of the postal department that when a stage route delivers from a postoffice it shall not deliver within a mile of nor beyond another postoffice. The stage line out of here which goes to Merrill cannot drop mail anywhere in the last mile of the route, which is hard for people living in that lap to understand. They hate to see the stage go by with their mail to Merrill when time would be saved if it were dropped at their doors.

A number of folks who live on the other side of Lost River would like to have the stage, after it strikes Merrill, come back along the other side of the river, but this cannot be done, owing to the rule against delivery beyond another postoffice. They are not greatly pleased at the rule, which they do not appreciate, and one man, particularly, has been insistent in trying to "beat the system."

rated, the uniformity of the terrace is important.

Lawns planted prior to May, 1911, are classed as old lawns.

Lawns planted since May, 1911, are to be classed as new lawns.

Points to be Observed in Choosing Best Flower Garden

1.—Care, cultivation and freedom from weeds.

2.—Condition of plants, indicating vigor, flower producing capacity, and appearance, such as pruning, trimming, training, etc.

3.—Rotation of flowering plants to secure constant succession and supply of flowers.

4.—Arrangement with regard to artistic landscape effect.

Outline for Choosing Best-Kept Yard

1.—The lawn.

2.—Vines, shrubbery and flowering plants. (a) The first two should be observed as to pruning, training and condition generally. Any flowers in beds or shrubbery where cultivated should be noted as to weediness, care, etc. The placing of vines, shrubbery, etc., with regard to artistic effect, is also important.

3.—The condition of walks, drives, etc., and their placing also should have a bearing.
