CLEAN UP THE CITY

IF THE morning paper is afraid to take a stand for the protection of the morals of the city, The Herald is willing to take the initiative for the Press in the movement. The Herald will make the fight for the enforcement of law and for a clean moral city. We would be pleased to have the support of the Northwestern, and would request that Mr. Evans lay aside personalities for a time and take definite action to show the people of Klamath Falls where he stands in the matter.

This is a question that must be met squarely. We may all have our ideas as to the proper regulation of vice, but the law sanctions no such regulation or recognition; and if the citizens demand the enforcement of the law in regard to bawdy houses, gambling, etc., it is the duty of the public officials to enforce that law.

We do not see why Mr. Evans should assume that the mayor and police officials are opposed to the enforcement of the law. An examination of the police judge's records will show that the law is being strictly enforced every day. Recently the police have broken up two bawdy houses outside of the restricted district, and secured convictions in gambling cases as well as other violations of the law, and we have assurance from both the city and county officers that the wishes of the signers of the petition to the council last evening will be carried out.

Klamath Falls is going to be cleaned of houses of ill-fame, gambling and other violators of the law.

VAUGHN WILL BE KEPT BUSY

POUNDMASTER IS ALSO GIVEN THE JOB OF STREET SUPERINTENDENT—SALARY IS FIXED AT \$80 PER MONTH

City sidewalks cannot be improved under the Sanderson charter without a street superintendent, according to the interpretation of that instrument to the council last night by City Attorney Thomas Drake. So the council had to face the question of getting a street superintendent, owing to the large number of sidewalks which need fixing.

Not having any spare change in the city jeans, it was decided to get somebody who would serve without the city being "set back" any more in salary. Finally it was determined to let Ralph Vaughn serve as street superintendent, in addition to the onerous duties as poundmaster. The police committee offered a report fixing the salary of the poundmaster at \$80 per month and \$20 for horse hire. Mayor Nicholas said the poundmaster would also look after the enforcement of the dog ordinance. There are a great many dogs in the city which have no licenses.

PORTABLE SCHOOL HOUSES REQUIRED

GREAT INCREASE IN SCHOOL CHILDREN IN PORTLAND LEAD AUTHORITIES TO HURRIED METHODS

PORTLAND, Sept. 4.—Overcrowded conditions will prevail in Portland schools again this year, and make necessary recourse to portable school houses to care for the children, according to R. H. Thomas, city school clerk.

Estimates made by school officials show that approximately 20,000 children will attend the public schools of the city during the 1912-13 school year, which opens September 16th. This is an increase of 10 per cent over the enrollment of last year. Of this number, 27,000 will attend elementary classes and 3,000 the high schools and trade school.

Owing to the large increase of students, the school board plans to select at least 50 additional teachers at its regular meeting Thursday. At present 800 teachers are employed.

Anticipating a large increase in school attendance, Mr. Thomas said the school board made efforts this summer to enlarge the permanent housing facilities, but was unable to do so in the short time allowed. As a result it will be necessary to employ fifteen or twenty portable school houses.

WANT BIDS FOR MAIL CONTRACT

FOR CARRYING MAIL TO AND FROM ODESSA THE GOVERNMENT WILL ALLOW 10 HOURS. DISTANCE IS 20 MILES

Postmaster Clyde K. Brandenburg has posted at the postoffice and court house notices that bids are wanted for carrying mail from Odessa to Klamath Falls, 28 miles, and back three times a week from December 1, 1912, to March 1, 1913.

Trips are to be made leaving Odessa at 7 a. m. Monday, Wednesday and Friday, and Klamath Falls at the same hour Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday. The 28 miles is to be made in ten hours, and a bond of \$1,000 must be given.
