BLOWS BRING FORTH BLOOD

END OF THE PRISON RIOTING HAS BEEN ATTAINED

Continuation of Story of the Flogging of Prisoners is Impossible to Secure—More Prisoners are Slated for Punishment Today—Nine Receive Terrible Punishment Yesterday—Blows Were Severe

United Press Service JACKSON, Mich., Sept. 6.—The revolt of prisoners in the state penitentiary is now over, and the punishment of the ringleaders is now in progress. Fifteen men will be flogged today.

Nine men were whipped yesterday, according to a guard. These prisoners were tied over barrels, gagged and lashed with three-inch leather paddles soaked in brine.

The men were given from ten to thirty blows each. Blood was almost always drawn.

The warden of the penitentiary has refused to confirm the story of the flogging.

The police have reported that ex-convicts are gathering in groups on the streets here. There are thousands of them in the city, and it is feared that they are planning to attack the militia men.

The ex-convicts say that the punishment inflicted on the convicts was terrific, and that their bodies were in a horrible condition after whipping.

Coupe says that he saw the men whom he assumed to be the murderers getting into an automobile. A night watchman told him that he had seen Becker crossing Forty-third street at 4 o'clock on the morning of the murder.

ROAD TO SHASTA IS NOW READY

SISSON BOOSTER CLUB MAKES IT EASIER FOR TOURISTS TO VISIT THE FAMOUS MOUNTAIN BY BUILDING TRAIL

The Mt. Shasta national forest officials, assisted by the Sisson Booster Club, has just completed the building of a splendid trail to the timber line on Mt. Shasta, costing \$358.

This, it is asserted, has changed the journey from a toilsome one to a pilgrimage comparatively easy, at no place over a 16 per cent grade through shady groves.

There are signs indicating water as well as mile posts, and between the public square in Sisson and Horse Camp there are eight of the posts. The distance from the town square to the summit is 11.27 miles. To Horse Camp, 8 miles, the trip may be made on horseback and the traveler may rest until early the next morning to undertake the steep ascent of 2.27 miles.

There has been an unusual number of climbers up the mountain this summer, attributable largely to the improved road.

ARMY OFFICERS FALL TO DEATH

BODIES ARE CRUSHED BEYOND RECOGNITION AFTER 1,000-FOOT DROP—WERE PARTICIPATING IN MANEUVERS

United Press Service LONDON, Sept. 6.—Captain Patrick Hamilton and Lieutenant A. E. Stewart of the Royal Flying Corps of the army, fell 1,000 feet from a flying machine today and were instantly killed.

They were participating in the army maneuvers near Cravely. Their monoplane was broken in two and the two bodies were mangled beyond recognition.

LOS ANGELES GETS SHOCKS

TWO TREMORS ARE FELT IN THE METROPOLIS OF SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA—RATTLING OF WINDOWS ATTRACTS NOTICE

MOTHER JONES EXCITES MINERS

EFFORT WILL BE MADE TO PREVENT WOMAN FROM SPEAKING AT WEST VIRGINIA STATE CAPITOL TONIGHT

United Press Service CHARLESTON, W. Va., Sept. 6.—Efforts are to be made to prevent Mother Jones from speaking at the state capitol tonight.

Miners are idle in the Kanawha district, and 10,000 miners are coming to Charleston for the demonstration against the government.

Mother Jones will lead the parade to the state capitol and learn from the governor whether guards will come back after martial law has been lifted. The streets are crowded with excited people, and the militia has been ordered to be in readiness.

UNIONS ARE NOT ADVISED OF PLAN

ALL LINES OF INDUSTRY MAY BE AFFECTED BY STRIKE

Date of Industrial Upheaval is Fixed as September 30th—Plan of the Prosecution of Strikers is Told by Head of the Workers—The Industrial Workers of World Are First to Hear Call.

NEW YORK, Sept. 6.—In protest of the imprisonment of Etter and Giovannitti, strikers who are still imprisoned in Lawrence, Mass., William Haywood announced today that all members of the Industrial Workers of the World, men and women, of all trades, would be called on to go on a strike on September 30th.

Haywood will issue a call to all workers of the country to strike. The call will be printed immediately in all possible languages and will be directed to all classes of workers, without regard to union organization affiliations.

Haywood declares that he had discovered that the prosecution of the Lawrence strikers plans to hold the men in jail for an indefinite time, and will not permit a trial at the fall term of court.

The labor leader says that feeling is bitter, especially among the foreign speaking workers. A committee has completed arrangements for a general strike without limitation.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 6.—Regarding Haywood's threatened strike, Secretary Frank Morrison of the American Federation of Labor said:

"Organized labor will not quit work in response to any call of Haywood. I am quite sure that there is not a member of any union affiliated (Continued on Page 4)
