DIPPY HOUSE NEEDS REPAIRS

NEW SUPERINTENDENT OF INSTITUTION INTERVIEWS STATE BOARD REGARDING MANY CHANGES

SALEM, Sept. 6.—Dr. McNary of Portland, recently appointed superintendent of the Eastern Oregon Insane asylum, is here conferring with the members of the state board over the tentative budget and needed improvements for the new institution. He and the members of the board state that a large appropriation will be needed from the next legislature in order to put the new asylum on a running basis.

A large part of the \$15,000 maintenance fund, appropriated to carry the institution to the first of next year will be used in furnishing the main building. Then requests will be made for appropriations for stock barns, fences, cottages and other improvements. The members of the board expect to visit the institution within the next few weeks personally to go over the ground and ascertain its needs.

VILLAGE COMES TO LIFE AGAIN

PLACE NEAR MARSHFIELD TAKES ON A LIVE APPEARANCE AFTER LIVING DORMANT FOR A LONG TIME

MARSHFIELD, Sept. 6.—A deserted coal mine, unoccupied houses and but three or four inhabitants for several years has been all there was of Libby, a settlement three miles from this city, one of the oldest towns in the county, and which for many years was an active place. However, the deserted village is being revived. The real name of the town is Newport, but many years ago the coal mine there was called Libby, in honor of an old Indian woman of the locality, and the name has stuck to the place.

MEAT PRICES GO TO THE TOP NOTCH

PORTLAND, Sept. 6.—Everything has gone up in the local livestock market, and in no halting or uncertain manner.

The price of prime steers was raised from \$7, last week's top quotation, to \$7.25 a hundred. Similarly, test grade cows went from \$6.25 to \$6.35.

In the sheep division buyers were in evidence as usual, and the most important transaction reported there was the sale of a bunch of high grade

yearlings at \$4.65, 15 cents above the previous top quotation.

For hogs the demand, as usual, was far in excess of the supply, with the result that buyers who last week bought the best at \$9.25 today were glad to pay \$9.35 for the same grade of stock.

Still higher prices all along the line are to be expected as the season advances. That is the opinion of men in the livestock trade, and as a rule they are well informed regarding supply and demand conditions.

WEST IS AFTER THE DRUNKARDS

SALOONS THAT SELL TO PERSONS UNDER THE INFLUENCE OF LIQUOR WILL BE APT TO LOSE THEIR LICENSES

PORTLAND, Sept. 6.—Three saloons in the Jefferson street depot of the Oregon Electric railway were notified to close at once by order of Governor West, on the ground that they are public nuisances. The governor made the announcement late this afternoon.

"I have instructed H. M. Esterly, special prosecutor, to bring injunction proceedings against these places right away," said Governor West. "They are a disgrace to the city. Two of them open on the station platform, and passengers have to walk past drunks who are rolling about. I have received many complaints about the places. They must close immediately."
