BERLIN, Sept. 7.—Patients of a
prominent physician here were some-
what startled when they called one
day this week to be met by a man at
the door of the doctor's office, who
said:

"The doctor is very ill. I am sorry
I cannot promise him that he will
live three days. I am his represen-
tative, and have taken over his prac-
tice. Please come in."

Several patients followed each other
into the consultation room, for
each of whom he wrote a prescrip-
tion. As the patients discussed in
the outer room the illness of their
regular physician, they remarked up-
on the peculiar actions of the new
doctor. Several looked at their pre-
scriptions.

To a woman who came for medi-

cine for a severe headache he had
prescribed: "Hold tongue for twenty-
four hours." The prescription for a
society woman's stomach trouble
read: "Eight days light field work."
A man suffering with rheumatism
found on his prescription, "boar-
hound candy," and a woman who had
told the doctor "I am so nervous"
found her prescription to read:

three times daily."

The patients agreed that there was

sent out for a policeman when the
regular physician, who had been out
on a case, came in. It developed
that the "doctor's representative"
was a former insane patient whom he
believed he had cured.

MAYOR SMITH IS UNDER ARREST

EXECUTIVE OF GRANTS PASS IS
CHARGED WITH MISAPPLYING
AND CONVERTING FUNDS TO
HIS OWN USE

PORTLAND, Sept. 7.—Mayor Robert
G. Smith of Grants Pass, demo-
cratic nominee for congress in the
First district, has been placed under
arrest at Grants Pass by Deputy
United States Marshal Frank Beatty.
An order for arrest was issued by
the federal district court here upon
the affidavit of Attorney Dan Earle,
charging that Smith as an attorney
at law had "fraudulently misapplied
and converted" funds paid him by
James D. Lacey as the agent of the
Cleopatra Development company.
Bonds were fixed at \$5,000, which
Smith is reported to have furnished
immediately with James Logan, a
mine owner of the Waldo district,
and A. A. Porter of Grants Pass as
sureties.

The arrest is incidental to a civil
suit brought against Smith to recover
\$2,490, which he is charged with
wrongfully appropriating, and to se-
cure \$1,000 damages alleged to have
been sustained by Lacey and the Cleo-
patra company as a result of their
transactions with Smith.

Assessment Due
This is the day the paving as-
sessment for the first, second and third

River bridge to the Southern Pacific
depot and on Sixth street are due to
the city. They will become delin-
quent in twenty days.
