

## Under Arrest, Rich is Coming Back to Face Charges Commoner Says He Will Camp on Roosevelt's Trail

### SHOE MAN NOT TO BE CONTRARY

#### ACCUSED WILL NOT FIGHT AGAINST EXTRADITION

L. B. Rich's relatives in San Francisco will provide ample funds for the defense of the young man—Grand Jury Pass Girl Denies Interview Credited to Her in the Morning Northwest.

#### PERSECUTION CHARGED

Wronged Woman Declares Newspaper Tells Untruths

"The statement in the Northwesters this morning to the effect that I sought to withdraw the charge against Mr. Rich is untrue," Mrs. Rich No. 3 stated this morning. "The story was made of whole cloth, and does not contain an atom of truth. It seems to me that the Northwesters ought to stop its apparently systematic attempt to shield the man who has so grossly wronged me, and thus place me in an unfavorable position before the people of this city. My position is hard enough without this added persecution on the part of that newspaper."

L. B. Rich, a few days ago rated as a prosperous Klamath Falls merchant, is returning to this city this afternoon on a Southern Pacific train in custody of Sheriff Barnes, while his sixteen-year-old daughter, not yet out of her teens, is almost in hysterics from the worry incidental to the discovery that she has been living with a man for months as his wife, when in reality, he had years before married a young San Francisco woman, one of his own race.

Rich, when arrested in Dummur yesterday, indicated that he would resist extradition to Oregon to face a charge of bigamy. When Sheriff Barnes arrived in the California town last night he was informed that Rich's father had retained counsel to fight extradition. This morning, however, young Rich agreed to come back to Klamath Falls without the formality of extradition, and Sheriff Barnes headed the first north bound train, and is now en route here with his prisoner.

That there will be a hard legal battle before the trial of Rich is concluded has been indicated by the messages which have been received here from San Francisco from the parents.

### BULGARIANS TO BATTLE TURKS

ALTHOUGH NOT FORMALLY DECLARED, IT IS CONSIDERED THAT HOSTILITIES HAVE ACTUALLY BEEN STARTED

CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 12.—The minister of war has ordered the mobilization of fifteen divisions of the army reserves. He considers that war with Bulgaria has practically been started, although not formally declared.

ROME, Sept. 12.—The government has called a big force of militia for field duty. The army will soon be on a war basis.

### DUCK SHARED IN BARBED FENCE

At the intersection of the Southern Pacific road and the Lost River diversion channel a duck couple of days since met a singular death. It endeavored to fly through a barbed wire fence which marks the road's right of way, and caught the web of its foot in a barb, struggling as long as it could to free itself, but without avail. Life finally left the body, and the remains today hung there as a warning to other ducks to beware the perils of the barbed wire fence.

### NEGRO'S WIFE TAKES OWN LIFE

#### MRS. JACK JOHNSON COMMITTS SUICIDE IN A ROOM OVER THE CHAMPION PRIZE FIGHTERS' CHICAGO CAFE

CHICAGO, Sept. 12.—Mrs. Jack Johnson, wife of the colored prize fighter, died at 3 o'clock this morning with a bullet in her brain. She was formerly Etta Duryea, the divorced wife of Clarence Duryea, a millionaire New York horseman. Mrs. Johnson committed suicide in a room over her husband's cafe.

No word has as yet been received from the Mission, Calif., lodge, which was expected to come here for the event, and it is now believed that the Mission brethren have decided to go to Sacramento for a celebration September 17th.

As it is hardly likely that the Mission lodge would be able to make two junkets so close together, the opinion prevails among the local lodge members that Mission will not be represented in the local celebration.

### BEERS IS SURE OF ELECTION

#### VETERANS FAVOR MAN FROM BRIDGEPORT, CONN., TO BE HEAD OF G. A. R.—1913 MEETING PLACE CAUSES BATTLE

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 12.—The 40th G. A. R. encampment was officially called to order in the auditorium, Lieutenant Governor Wallace delivering the address of welcome.

Responses were made by representatives of the G. A. R. and affiliated bodies.

Interest today centered in the battle for the 1913 encampment. Detroit and Denver are in the lead. The choice will be made tomorrow.

### GRAND JURY IS SURELY PROBING

#### A NUMBER OF WITNESSES ARE HEARD THIS MORNING

Marion Hanks, Former Councilman and Present When Bribe Demand Was Made by Councilmen, Is Called Before the Jury—No details of the Testimony Adduced Have Been Secured—Tipton is a Witness

The Klamath county grand jury appears to be going into the charges made by The Herald against three Klamath Falls councilmen in a thorough manner. This morning John Tipton, Marion Hanks, Fred Melhase and F. R. Olds were summoned before the jury to tell what they know of the graft charges.

Mr. Tipton is clerk in the Hotel Hall. He was employed in a similar capacity when that hotel was known as the Livermore, and is reported to have been a creditor shortly before the Livermore was closed up. He accepted in payment of his debt some whiskey, which he afterward sold to Jas. Wheeler, who took over the Livermore bar. Mr. Tipton at one time took legal advice with a view of preventing the transfer of the Livermore license on the ground that there were at that time more saloons here than the city ordinances permitted.

Marion Hanks, hardware dealer here, was one of the creditors of the Livermore, and was present at the first interview between the city councilmen and Wheeler, when the demand was made on the latter for the payment of a sum of money in order to effect the transfer of the bar license. Mr. Hanks had been a member of the old city council, but did not have a vote on the license transfer matter.

### ADMITS HE IS PEOPLE'S CHOICE

#### COLONEL ROOSEVELT DECLARES THAT HE DID NOT SEEK NOMINATION UNTIL OTHERS HAD FAILED TO GO FORWARD

LA GRANDE, Ore., Sept. 12.—"I only came out for the nomination when those whom I believed would carry the cause of the people forward had turned backward and deserted the people," asserted Colonel Roosevelt in a speech here which started his Oregon and Idaho tour.

The ex-president's voice was hoarse. He dwelt insistently on the progressive movement as being impersonal. The colonel will speak in Huntington, Ore., Nampa and Boise, Idaho, today.

### SWEET CLOVER IS FARM PEST

#### MIDLAND ROAD IS THREATENED BY PLANT THAT IS ALL RIGHT WHEN IT IS YOUNG, BUT BAD WHEN AGED

On the Midland road a short distance west of the Sixth street county road there is a considerable growth of sweet clover, which is one of the worst farm pests that is known in this part of the country.

When the growth is young it makes an attractive feed for cattle and sheep, although horses do not care much for it. When it gets its growth and age the animals do not like it. It makes a nice honey, but there are no bees in the vicinity to get the advantage of it, and the chances are it will shortly be removed.

### SAW MILLS TO START UP SOON

#### FIRST SALE OF INDIAN RESERVATION TIMBER AUTHORIZED

Application for Many Million Feet Have Been Made to the Government and the First Step in a Comprehensive Plan Has Been Taken. Many Billion Feet of Timber Said to Be Available

As the first step in the announced plan of selling about ten billion feet of timber on the Klamath Indian reservation, Superintendent Edson Watson of the reservation advertised today for bids on 1,500,000 feet of timber. This will be the first sale of timber on the reservation, and it will be followed up with others.

A. K. Chittendon, head of the forest bureau of the Indian service, has been in the region for some time going over the timber on the reservation. He made an investigation of the application recently made by a Seattle firm for 400,000,000 feet of timber, and it is understood that his report to the department will favor the sale.

Applications are now on file with the Indian service for a large amount of timber in lots ranging from one to fifteen million feet.

There is a saw mill near the timber not advertised for sale, and it is probable that the owners of this mill will be the only bidders. The government, however, fixes a minimum price, and a sale cannot be made unless this price, at least, is bid.

Under the regulations, timber sold on Indian reservations must be cut within ten years, so that if the timber applied for by the Seattle firm is sold it will mean that a large mill will be erected in some place near the Indian reservation and put in operation soon after the sale is confirmed.

### MINING MAN IS LOCATED

TACOMA, Sept. 12.—Mourning as dead since his disappearance in December, 1902, Phillip D. Rice, brother of Stuart and Edmund Rice of Tacoma, and son of the late Edmund Rice, twice mayor of St. Paul, today has been located in a Utah mining camp.

An alleged unhappy marriage to a young woman shortly before he left is thought to have been the cause of his disappearance.

### JURORS HARD TO GET INTO COURT

#### BONANZA SCHOOL DISTRICT CASE IS CONTINUED UNTIL TOMORROW MORNING IN ORDER TO SECURE VENIPIRENS

Eight jurors remained unchallenged in the circuit court this morning in the case of the Klamath County Bank vs. School District No. 2 and R. E. Wattenburg when the available material was exhausted.

### ERROR CAUSES A BIG LAUGH

#### BRIEF MAKES ATTORNEY ASK FOR \$50,000 FEE IN SUIT TO RECOVER \$25 ON A MECHANIC'S LIEN

Owing to a typographical error in a printed brief, friends of a well known Klamath Falls follower of Blackstone and Kent are chaffing the lawyers for his exorbitant charges for legal services. The case was one wherein the plaintiff sought a verdict for \$96 on a mechanic's lien, the brief setting forth that the case is brought for that amount and \$50,000 lawyer's fees. The huge size of the "bit" asked by the lawyer, as compared with the principal sum involved, has caused many a laugh at the barister's expense. What he meant to ask was \$50.

### JOHNSON MAN IS DEFEATED

#### CALIFORNIA GOVERNOR IS INCENSED BECAUSE HIS FOLLOWERS DID NOT PERFORM THE PROPER AMOUNT OF WORK

SACRAMENTO, Sept. 12.—Aroused to eleventh hour activity by the nomination of a Taft "standpatter," Chas. F. Curry, in the congressional district which includes the capital of the original progressive state, the friends of Governor Johnson today are making a rapid survey of the Third district for a candidate to be nominated by petition as an independent. They will pick the man, place his name on the November ballot, and concentrate most of their efforts for the next sixty days upon the fight to elect him over Curry.

Whether the governor has sent home his opinion of the poor work done in behalf of Devlin at the primary is not divulged.

Organization of the fight will be perfected within a few days.

### BRYAN IS TO BE HIS OWN BACKER

#### DEMOCRAT WILL SPEAK WHEREVER ROOSEVELT DOES

National Committee Is Informed of the Plans of the Nobelesque—His Speech-Making Tour Will Start in Denver, and Will Include Chiles in Colorado, Utah, Montana, Nevada, California, Washington and Oregon

NEW YORK, Sept. 12.—William Jennings Bryan has wired to the Democratic National committee details of a plan in which he will take the trail of Colonel Roosevelt, starting next Saturday.

Bryan will start his speaking campaign in Denver, and will speak in every place that Roosevelt appears in Colorado, Utah, Montana, Nevada, California, Washington and Oregon. He will return to Lincoln October 2, and, after a couple of days' rest, will resume the Roosevelt trail until election day.

Bryan will pay his own expenses. He has given up all of his private engagements to take part in the campaign.

Excursion to Ball Game Next Sunday baseball fans in this section will have a chance to witness what is to them a very important event. The Chico and Weed teams, which have won the majority of the games in their respective localities, and are regarded as the champion teams between Sacramento and Medford, will meet on the diamond at Mission for a purse of \$500 and the championship of the territory. Special trains will be run to the game.

## Curious People Wait for Mexicans to Start Battle

### Hundreds of Sightseers Pour Into Douglas to Witness the Struggle, Which Seems Inevitable. Rebels may Cross the United States Frontier

DOUGLAS, Ariz., Sept. 12.—Federal scouts arriving from Agua Prieta this afternoon say that the rebels are advancing in a solid body, and are within three hours' march of the frontier. It is reported that the rebels declare that the action of the United States government in granting permission to the federalists to cross American soil absolves them from trespassing if they should see fit to do so. Fifty American negro soldiers were disarmed by officers after a clash, when the soldiers invaded the territorial district, kicking down doors they found locked. Trouble is feared. Effecting a junction about ten miles from Agua Prieta, Rojas and Salazar began a march on the town at noon today with 1,400 well equipped men. Four hundred Yaqui Indians reinforced the federalists, and are deploying on the plains east and south of the town where they will make a stand. Hundreds of people are pouring into Douglas to see the battle, which it is believed is inevitable. Escobosa Hanged United Press Service EL PASO, Texas, Sept. 12.—Escobosa, a rebel leader, was hanged today by orders of General Rojas. He refused to join the main body of the army at Agua Prieta.
