

SIGHTSEERS ARE MUCH FOOLED

A FEW SCATTERED SHOTS BY FEDERAL OUTPOSTS FURNISH THE ONLY AMUSEMENT FOR THOSE WHO WOULD SEE WAR

DOUGLAS, Ariz., Sept. 13.—The federal garrison at Agua Prieta is in full possession of the city, the rebels having withdrawn at daybreak to Conima Springs, twelve miles southeast.

It is reported that Rojas is seeking water, and will return before night. Desultory firing by the federal outposts marked the appearance of the rebels late yesterday. No one was hurt. There has been no firing to-day.

I suspected there was something wrong when he told me that he had a cousin living in Salt Lake, and wanted to know how to get there by the quickest route."

LABOR UNIONS FAVOR NEITHER

ROOSEVELT AND WILSON ARE IN THE SAME CLASS, SO FAR AS ORGANIZED LABOR GOES, IS REPORT SENT OUT

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 13.—An increase in organized labor's representation in congress is the keynote of the political program which will be announced tomorrow in a new letter from the American Federation of Labor.

In this letter President Taft is scored, but neither Wilson or Roosevelt is endorsed.

The political bulletin has been approved by President Gompers, and it calls on union labor to elect municipal, county, state and congressional candidates who are favorable to labor.

L. R. RICH IS NOW IN JAIL

between himself and the state of Oregon would result in a needless expenditure of money, and the prisoner agreed to return here without putting Klamath county to any further expense on one condition.

"We will arrive at the Falls late," Rich is reported to have argued. "It will be almost impossible for me to secure money until the next day. If you will agree not to put me in jail tonight, I will return with you."

Sheriff Barnes considered the expense which would fall on the county in the event of Rich making a fight, and finally agreed to Rich's proposal.

Last night Rich was kept under guard of Marion Barnes in the Hotel Hall, and this morning was taken before Justice Graves. C. F. Stone appeared as counsel, and a continuance was taken, without fixing the amount of bond. Rich was then lodged in the Klamath county jail.

Mr. Stone stated this morning that he did not know whether or not he would make Rich's defense at the trial.

"I have made no definite arrangements for conducting the defense," said Mr. Stone. "I have been asked to look out for the young man's interests, and I am doing so temporarily. I have advised him to make no statements, because I do not want to do anything in the case that some other lawyer, who may be engaged, might disapprove of. I desire that the case may be left in such a position that any lawyer may take it up and conduct the defense."

Prosecuting Attorney Kuykendall has effectively disposed of the reported legal tangle as to the place where Rich will be tried by making the charge polygamy instead of bigamy. As a result of selecting this charge the case may be tried here without a legal question being raised, because, if the contentions of the prosecution are correct, Rich lived here with Jessie Layton as man and wife, when, in reality he had another wife in San Francisco.

NEW MILL IS NOW OPERATED

FIRST PRIVATE-OWNED SAWING CONCERN IS STARTED ON THE KLAMATH INDIAN RESERVATION—CAPACITY 50,000 DAILY

The Chilquim Lumber company is now a reality, and lumber at the rate of 30,000 feet per day is being cut for domestic as well as foreign markets.

W. I. Clarke, president of the new company, returned today from Chilquim. He has been there completing arrangements for the carrying on of the project. The saw mill is located about three miles north of Chilquim on the railroad.

The market for the product of the mill will be principally by rail, California and Eastern points, but a contract has already been secured for clear in Australia.

The railroad construction camp of Erickson & Peterson has been taken over by the new company, the first private owned mill on the Indian reservation.

It is the plan to log all winter and run the mill whenever the weather will permit.

W. I. Clarke is president of the new company, incorporated a week ago, and J. W. Newhart is general manager.

FERGUSON WILL WORK HIMSELF

PROPOSITION TO HIRE A BUNCH OF STENOGRAPHERS TO ACCOMPLISH TASK DOES NOT WORK OUT JUST RIGHT

Circumstances objected so strenuously to United States Commissioner Charles J. Ferguson hiring half a dozen girls to get out a batch of testimony by the dictaphone that he had to give it up. It was in the case of the United States vs. Bunting and Bunting that the commissioner, who is, he it known, an expert stenographer, not only acted as commissioner but as stenographer as well.

The two weeks' trial of the case resulted in much verbiage, and 663 pages of shorthand notes, so Mr. Ferguson thought, as he had to go to San Francisco to meet his brother, W. A. Ferguson, who had come down from Alaska, that he would kill two birds with one stone by a visit to his kinsman and the performance of the work at the same time.

So he hid him to the Golden Gate City, but found that his brother had to be in Santa Cruz. The commissioner went to Santa Cruz, where there were no half dozen stenographers and a dictaphone, and sent to San Francisco for a typewriter, determined to do the work himself. He got through with about two-thirds of the testimony, and will finish it as fast as his other work will permit.

His brother has investments in Alaska, and does not frequently get this far down in the states.

Jurors in Civil Action are Cautioned by Judge Benson After Infraction is Called to His Attention

Some of the farmers who have come to town in answer to summons for jury duty, when questioned in the circuit court this morning in the First National bank vs. School District No. 2, admitted having spoken of the case to others on reaching the city, and before going into court.

"Under ordinary circumstances those who have done this would be guilty of contempt of court," said Judge Henry L. Benson, at the time of the noon recess, "and in such event you would stand liable to punishment for the offense. But in this instance it appears to have been inadvertently done, and with no intention of violating the rules of the court. With this caution you are warned not to discuss this case with others nor permit them to discuss it with you while you are out of the court room."
