President Says That Woodrow Wilson Made a Number of False Assertions in His Speech in Minneapolis Yesterday—Fact That Trust Officers Oppose Him is Taken by Roosevelt as a Hint for Him

TRINIDAD, Colo., Sept. 19.—Colonel Roosevelt in a speech here today replied to Wilson's Minneapolis speech. He said in part:

"Wilson has a right to defend his own platform and assail the progressives, but he should confine himself to the facts. He states that the methods proposed by the progressives to regulate the trusts was suggested by Gary and Perkins. This statement is not in accordance with the facts. I call attention to the fact that an overwhelming majority of the men controlling the steel corporation and the harvest trust are opposing me. The only man connected with either organization who is supporting me is Perkins."

WORK STARTS ON BUILDING

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 19.—Although the United States army has persistently refused to buy aeroplanes or monoplane of foreign manufacture for its aerial corps, the Molcan International Aviators have established an aviation school right near the government reservation at College Park, Md., in an effort to get the war department officials interested and secure some orders from the United States government.

The commercial enterprise of this foreign company has manifested itself in the purchase of several acres of land at College Park, upon which hangars have been erected at a considerable cost. All this is simply for demonstration work. The army has heretofore refused to buy any but the Wright or Curtiss machines.

NEW SYSTEM TO SAVE MONEY

RECENT INVENTION WILL SAVE THE POSTOFFICE DEPARTMENT ABOUT \$200,000 ANNUALLY IN AUDITING FORCE

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 19.—A saving of \$200,000 annually to the postoffice department will be effected by the installation of a number of small mechanical electrical devices used for auditing the \$8,000,000 money orders received by the auditor for the postoffice department.

Since 1864 the system of auditing has been substantially the same. Until Auditor Charles A. Kram devised the tabulating and sorting machines, it was necessary to check by hand each order against the issuing postmaster. Under this process a year was required to complete the audit, and each slip had to be handled nine times.

This mechanical tabulation is effected with small cards and four types of machines—card punching, gang punching, sorting and tabulating.

Upon being ordered to climb into the saddle he spurred the horse so violently that the officer, in attempting to mount behind his captive was thrown off and badly bruised, while the redskin rode swiftly away.

NAVAL VESSEL TO SAIL CANAL

FORMAL OPENING WILL NOT BE UNTIL FIRST DAY OF 1915—COST WILL BE UNDER \$375,000,000 IN ESTIMATE

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The opening of the canal for general commercial purposes will be in December, 1914. It is announced that at the formal opening the world's navies will be invited to send representatives to participate in elaborate ceremonies. The president is expected to attend. All American warships will be mobilized there.
