MODEL FACTORY TO BE STARTED

GOVERNMENT MAKING ELABORATE PLANS FOR THE NEW PLANT OF THE BUREAU OF ENGRAVING AND PRINTING

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 15.—Uncle Sam is going to have a factory in Washington that will serve as a model for all industries. This is the new building for the bureau of engraving and printing, where all the government's paper money and postage stamps are made. Secretary of the Treasury MacVeagh hopes that the new structure will be an absolute model of perfection as regards hygiene and sanitation, and the health and comfort of the men and women employed there. Superbly lighted, with the most perfect ventilation, nothing will be left undone to make the employes healthful and comfortable. Secretary MacVeagh believes that the extra money spent in making these provisions will result in a big economy in the future. In addition to accessories such as wash rooms, etc., there will be a rest room for both men and women on each floor. An excellent lunch room will be established, where employes can get good service and wholesome food at a nominal cost. One of the features will be a roof garden. Here employes who do not care to leave the building at the noon hour, because it is inconvenient or because of bad weather, can get a breathing spell without leaving the establishment.

SPANKING IS COURT'S IDEA

ACTION FOR A DIVORCE DENIED TO MAN AND WOMAN WHO LIVED TOGETHER BUT TWO MONTHS

PORTLAND, Sept. 15.—"You are only kids. You don't need a divorce. The thing to do is to give both a spanking and send them home."

This was the remark of Judge McGinn in passing upon the divorce suit of Verne H. Doty against Vera Doty. The judge denied both parties a decree. As the husband, wife and witnesses left the court room Mrs. Doty fainted in the corridor. Court Bailiff Noonan restored her with cold water. The couple was married June 12, 1911, separating two months later. Doty alleged in his complaint that his wife refused to get his meals, insisted on bringing people to the house he did not like, and repeatedly telling him she loved another man. When he was ill in the hospital, he alleged, Mrs. Doty urged him to turn over all his money to her. He did not see her after that. She has filed suit for a divorce. The couple is about 20 years old.

STAGE WOMEN WORK FOR TAFT

PROMINENT ACTRESSES ARE ENROLLING IN THE RANKS OF THE WORKERS FOR THE RE-ELECTION OF THE PRESIDENT

NEW YORK, Sept. 15.—Prominent actresses, headliners in vaudeville of the feminine persuasion and chorus girls may be found in abundance at the women's headquarters of the republican national committee in the Times building, this city. A few days ago Miss Helen Varick Boswell, who has charge of the women's republican campaign committee, invited the women of the stage who were interested in the re-election of President Taft to visit the republican headquarters. It was the first appeal to be made to the stage—where there are many ardent suffragists—by any of the parties, and it has enhanced the Taft interests by leaps and bounds.

The stage women are asked to send their name, address, photo and a few remarks and they are enrolled as associate members of the republican women's campaign committee. The plan has about disrupted the support of other candidates, as far as feminine theaterdom is concerned.

STRAPHANGERS TO PAY 3 CENTS

NEW LAW BECOMES EFFECTIVE IN PORTLAND TOMORROW. ELECTRIC RAILWAY COMPANY WILL FIGHT MEASURE

PORTLAND, Sept. 15.—The ordinance providing for a minimum monthly rate of 50 cents for gas and electricity goes into effect Friday morning, as does also the measure providing for 3 cent fares for straphangers.

Both ordinances were passed by the city council August 14, and signed by Mayor Rushlight August 20th.

The Portland Railway, Light and Power company will, in all probability, contest the validity of the two measures. General Manager Papot of the Portland Gas and Coke company says the enforcement of the minimum gas rate will cost the company \$12,500 a year, but he has not stated whether the company would fight the ordinance in the court.
