

Two City Councilmen and Hunter Savidge Indicted Four of Seven John Doe Warrants Against Women

4 WOMEN ARE INCLUDED BY GRAND JURY

INDICTMENTS ARE RETURNED
BANDY HOUSE LANDLADIES

Verdict to Secure the Necessary Cash Result in the Holding of Four Women in Custody by the Sheriff—The Women Will Be Arraigned Before Court at 10 o'Clock Monday Morning

Four of the John Doe bench warrants ordered issued by Judge Benson after referring to the indictments returned by the grand jury late yesterday afternoon were for the arrest of women, and last night Deputy Sheriff Schallack and Marion Barnes proceeded to the restricted district and placed under arrest the landladies of the four reputed houses of prostitution there. They were taken before Judge Benson, but were not able to furnish the \$500 cash bail demanded and were placed in the custody of the sheriff.

Because the county jail does not offer accommodations for women, Sheriff Barnes made arrangements for the women being kept in custody in a private home, and last night two deputies guarded them. Up to a late hour this afternoon the four women were still in custody.

The women are charged with operating bawdy houses, contrary to the law of Oregon. They will be arraigned before Judge Benson Monday morning at 10 o'clock. At the same time as defendants will appear Hunter Savidge, Herbert Savidge and J. F. Goeller.

LAFFERTY WITH BULL MOOSERS

FORMER REPUBLICAN IS NOMINATED BY THE PROGRESSIVES FOR CONGRESS—IS NOW ON BOTH TICKETS

Congressman A. W. Lafferty has been given the Bull Moose nomination for congress in one, two, three order of the third party at headquarters in the Oregon hotel. No other name was presented, for the progressive leaders had decided that Lafferty must be named because of the labor support he carries. Lafferty now wears the republican and progressive nominations. He was named by the republicans at the primaries, and they cannot now rid themselves of him, for the law does not permit his resignation and the republican committee could not substitute another candidate if he could. As Lafferty has come out for Roosevelt, the republican county committee has already taken a whack at him, and it is expected to counsel all "real" republicans to turn either to Thomas McCusker, independent, or M. G. Manly, the democratic nominee.

GREEK MINERS NOT TO STRIKE

PROMISE MADE TO GOVERNOR SPRY BY THE STRIKERS NOT TO MAKE TROUBLE WILL IN ALL PROBABILITY BE KEPT

SALT LAKE, SEPT. 21.—Governor Spry, Adjutant General Edgwood, Sheriff Sharp and the officials of the Utah Copper company had a long conference today. The result of the conference was the placing upon Sheriff Sharp the responsibility of preserving the peace. He was instructed to use the militia as a last resort.

Twenty-five strikebreakers were secretly taken into the Bingham mine this morning. The Greek section hands on the Rio Grande have refused to strike in sympathy, and all saloons at the camps have been closed until further orders.

Three hundred deputies are guarding the properties affected by the strike. The pickets in the fortifications are apparently determined to keep their promise to Governor Spry not to start any trouble.

MEDFORD MAN DISTRICT DEPUTY

He is a son of ex-Lieutenant Governor Thurston Daniels of Washington, and was at one time a newspaper man in Portland.

DIGNITY OF THE JUDGE RUFFLED

A GOVERNMENT SURVEYOR ESCAPES A REPRIMAND BY HASTILY LEAVING COURT ROOM. FINE OF \$1 IS AWARDED

PORTLAND, Sept. 21.—It is seldom one of the dignified judges of the United States court becomes ruffled on the bench, but Judge Bean did so one day this week. The trial of Miles Grimshaw of Gresham, for changing a bench mark of a government survey, was in progress. Grimshaw pleaded guilty. The evidence showed that a member of a government surveying party set an elevation stake in front of the Grimshaw farm in a place the farmer kept plowed up to keep a noxious weed from overrunning his crops. He asked the surveyor to set it somewhere else, but the request was refused.

This spring the weed became very bad. Grimshaw again plowed the patch, and in order not to tear the stake from the earth, took a stone and drove it down to the level of the ground. The surveyor, E. M. Bandell, found it that way this spring, and filed charges against Grimshaw.

"Could that stake have been placed anywhere else," Judge Bean asked. The reply was in the affirmative.

"Since the defendant has pleaded guilty," John McCourt, federal district attorney, interposed, "I believe that a fine of \$10, or even \$5, would meet the ends of justice."

"One dollar is enough," Judge Bean thundered, and the surveyor left the court room just in time to escape a possible lecture from the bench.

REBEL LEADERS ARE IN CUSTODY

CHARGE IN MADE IN THE UNITED STATES THAT ACCUSED WERE INSTRUMENTAL IN THE MURDER OF MEXICAN TROOPS

EL PASO, Texas, Sept. 21.—Orosco Senior and Jose Cordova Somo, Orosco Junior's secretary, left Marfa this morning in the custody of a federal marshal for a hearing before the federal commissioner.

The Madero government charges them with the murder of the federal agents. Others implicated were executed at Jaurea as spies.

In a battle between the federal and the rebels under Orosco Junior near the Coahuila border, the rebels were defeated and retreated into the hills.

SALT LAKE, Sept. 21.—The Magna-Arthur stamp mills at Garfield are closed, making 6,000 men out. Nearly 300 deputies are guarding the Bingham properties.

General Manager Jackling of the Utah Copper company, has returned from Los Angeles, and will take personal charge for the mine owners.

Moyer declares that he will probably call a strike of the Nevada Consolidated and Chino mines, where Jackling is interested.

The situation is tense. Governor Spry has notified the miners that if they attack men going to work he will call out the militia.

The strikers insist that they will not allow the strikebreakers to work. One hundred men are guarding the Rio Grande tracks in Bingham and Garfield, watching for strikebreakers. Foreigners have bought all the automatic pistols and ammunition in this city and nearby towns. All of the high-powered rifles have been sold to the mining companies.

Result of Deliberations of the Klamath County Grand Jury is Finally Made Public. Arrests Made

The Klamath county grand jury, after more than a week of investigation, has substantiated the charges made by The Herald against two Klamath Falls councilmen, and indictments charging them with "accepting and receiving a bribe" were returned to the circuit court last night. In addition an indictment charging a prominent citizen with extortion in connection with the same matter was returned.

Herbert Savidge, J. F. Goeller and Hunter Savidge are the men who must stand trial on serious charges, according to the mandate of the grand jury. The first two named are city councilmen and Hunter Savidge, a brother of the councilman, is president of the Savidge Bros. Lumber company.

If convicted, the two councilmen will be sentenced to imprisonment in the state penitentiary for terms ranging from five to fifteen years. Hunter Savidge, who is charged with extortion, would be sentenced to from three months to one year in the county jail, or from six months to two years in the state penitentiary upon conviction.

The news of the indictment of the two men did not become public until this morning, when Sheriff Barnes served the John Doe bench warrants which had been ordered issued by the court last night. Deputy Clerk of Court Chastain was engaged until a late hour in preparing the papers in the case, and early this morning the warrants were placed in the hands of the sheriff for service.

There was no surprise when the grand jury's findings were made known. The charges against the men had been given so much publicity that there was little doubt in the public mind as to the outcome of the grand jury investigation.

Following the service of the warrants, the three accused were given an opportunity to secure bonds, which had been fixed by Judge Benson at \$5,000 in each case, and about 2 o'clock the Savidge brothers appeared in the circuit court. Their bonds, signed by C. S. Moore and E. R. Reames, were approved by the court, and they were given their liberty. J. F. Goeller did not appear, but his bond, signed by E. R. Reames and J. W. Siemens, was approved.

The three defendants will be arraigned before Judge Benson at 10 o'clock Monday morning to plead. At the same time there will be arraigned
