# CRUEL CRAWFORD BLASTS HER HOPES

ATTORNEY GENERAL OF STATE  
RENDERS AN OPINION THAT  
PREVENTS YOUNG WOMAN  
FROM HOLDING AN OFFICE

SALEM, Sept. 21.—In an opinion rendered recently Attorney General Crawford holds that if a county clerk is advised that any person nominated for a county office is ineligible it is his duty not to place the name on the ballot; and the ruling puts a damper on the hopes of a young woman in Jackson county who has ambitions to become county school superintendent.

Evidently figuring that the suffrage amendment would pass at the general election, she became a candidate, and now desires her name to go on the ballot. Should she be elected and the suffrage amendment pass, the attorney general concedes she would be able to qualify. As she is not now, however, eligible to office, the county clerk can decline to put her name on the ballot, according to the attorney general's ruling, and she will be unable to make the race. The opinion is rendered at the request of the county school superintendent of Jackson county.

# WILD HORSES BEING SOUGHT

Hired riders are preparing for big Pendleton show. The animals are now being tried out by cowboys.

Pendleton, Sept. 21.—Under the direction of James H. Sturgis, the work of trying out the worst bucking horses for the Round-Up is going on daily at the park. Paid bucharos every afternoon mount outlaw horses collected from every section of the Northwest and test the "pitching" abilities of the animals.

Proving their ability to stay in fast company a large number of the mounts have hurled their riders to the ground, and "biting the dust" is a frequent experience of some of the best busters.

Engaged in trying out the 100 horses in the Round-Up corral are some of the best cowboys in Eastern Oregon, and when their labors are over the hardest bucking horses ever assembled in the West will be in the corral of Round-Up park, ready to match their tricks with those of the riders who will mount them before the eyes of thousands.

## SOME SUFFRAGE FACTS

One million women in the United States have full political rights.

Utah, a suffrage state, has the largest proportion of home owners of any state in the Union.

In Denver the women cast 55 per cent of the vote in the large residence wards, and only 4 per cent in the slum wards.

In most states about 60 or 65 per cent of the men vote. In Wyoming 90 per cent of the women vote. In Colorado 80 per cent of the women register and 72 per cent vote. In Idaho 40 per cent of the total vote is cast by women, though women are in the minority in that state.

In Colorado in the first eight months after women were enfranchised more books on political economy and civics were sold than in the whole twenty years previous.

In Seattle there were never 100 women devoting themselves to the suffrage campaign, but 22,000 women registered at the first election. And 80 per cent of the women voting in Seattle this year were married women of the "home."

Where women have voted the longest divorce is only one-eighth as great as in similar states where they do not vote.

About 30,000 women voted in Denver at the last election, and of these only 400 could be connected with any bad element.

There is no nation, no state, no city where women vote where the vote of undesirable women even remotely approaches that of the women of good repute.
