Called Press Service SAN DIEGO, Sept. 26.—The Lewis case has been postponed until October 21st. Mrs. Lewis, 19 years of age, today gave birth to a still-born child in a local sanitarium.

SAN DIEGO, Sept. 26.—Testimony was started here today in the case in which Herbert Lewis is charged with the murder of C. H. Tolliver, an inventor, and his wife, Catherine, on May 25th.

Lewis will plead insanity and invoke the unwritten law, declaring that Tolliver injured Mrs. Lewis, whose testimony is expected to rival that of Evelyn Thaw.

Chinese Soldiers in Mutiny, are Executed

SHANGHAI, Sept. 26.—Convicted of participating in a mutiny in Wu Chang, 350 soldiers were executed here today. More than 1,000 other soldiers who participated in the same mutiny, succeeded in evading arrest, and they are still at liberty. They have scattered all over the country, and there is but little hope of capturing them.

REVOLUTION IS FINALLY OVER

INSURGENT CHIEF WITH 700 MEN SURRENDERS TO AMERICAN ADMIRAL AND TROUBLE IN NICARAGUA COMES TO END

SECRETARY OF STATE OLCOTT IN PREPARING THE FORM FOR CERTIFICATION OF MANY CANDIDATES

SALEM, Sept. 26.—Hugh McLain of Marshfield has filed his acceptance of the democratic nomination for presidential elector. All presidential electors of all parties in the state have now filed acceptances.

Secretary of State Olcott is preparing the form of certification of candidates he shall make to county clerks. At the head of the ticket will be the names of the three regular republicans who will be designated as Taft-Sherman electors. Next will be the electors of the democratic party, then of the socialist party, then prohibitionists, and last the names of the progressives. At the head of the ballot will be instructions to vote for five.

Keno Bridge is Reported to be Very Unsafe

Members of the County Court Make an Inspection and the Bridge is Ordered Condemed by Them

The bridge across the Klamath River at Keno has been condemned by order of the county court. Notices to this effect have been posted on both sides of the bridge, and travel across the river at that point is at the risk of the travelers. Judge Worden and Commissioners Sumner and Merrill visited Keno recently and made a thorough inspection of the bridge. It was ascertained that the piling is rotten in many places. Owing to the lateness of the season it will be impossible to repair or erect a new bridge this year, but the county court plans to build a steel bridge there in the spring. There is considerable travel over the bridge, and a permanent and safe structure is considered necessary.

Hunter Savidge will be the first of the three men recently indicted in connection with the transfer of the Livermore bar license to be placed on trial, according to the calendar posted in circuit court this afternoon. His trial is set down for December 2d. The trial of his brother, Herbert Savidge, will occur on December 6th, and J. F. Goeller will be tried on December 10th. The first case on the calendar is that of the state against John D. Carroll, charged with larceny by bailment. He was arrested some time ago, and has since been under bonds. His case is set for trial November 15th. Following the trial of Hunter Savidge will occur the trial of Robert Allen, charged with raising a check from \$2 to \$200. The case against Rufus Stiles, charged with perjury in connection with the issuance of a marriage license, will come up December 9th. The cases against the four women who are charged with conducting bawdy houses are last on the calendar. Maud Evans will be first to be tried, on December 12th. On the same day it is expected to take up the case of Dorothy Ward. The next day the cases against Estelle Snodgrass and Jack Murray are set. All of the defendants in these cases are under bonds except Allen and the four women. Allen is confined in the county jail, while the women are kept under guard in one of the Oak street houses.

Murderers Are Not to be Hung Tomorrow

Acting Governor Wallace Reprives Three Men Who Were to Have Paid Penalty for their Crimes

Called Press Service SACRAMENTO, Sept. 26.—Lieutenant Governor Wallace today reprived Alexander Beafour, Willie Lule and Ed Williams, who were to have been hanged in the state penitentiary in San Quentin tomorrow. The Anti-Capital Punishment League has been working hard to prevent the execution of these men, and the movement to put to end to future executions in this state is being rapidly advanced. Lieutenant Governor Wallace in a statement this afternoon said that it was because of a petition signed by 50,000 people for the abolition of capital punishment that he had decided that there should be no more executions until the legislature acts or the people vote on the matter.
