COAL CLAIMS ARE CANCELLED

GOVERNMENT CONTINUES THE CLEAN-UP IN THE ALASKA DISTRICT—MILLIONAIRES ARE AFFECTED

JUNEAU, Alaska, Sept. 26.—Twelve more coal claims have been ordered cancelled by the commissioner of the general land office. The Lippy-Davis claims were situated 27 miles northeast of Katala, adjoining the Cunningham claims. The locators are stockholders in the Alaska Petroleum and Coal company, which was organized for the stated purpose of prospecting for oil in the Katala country, and to which all the locators transferred their coal claims.

The claims were located by Mayor George F. Cotterill of Seattle; Thos. S. Lippy, Seattle millionaire, known all over the United States because of his participation in golf tournaments; Clark Davis, a former clergyman; John Schram, Adolph Beehrens, John L. Moseley, Otto E. Sauter, Henry R. Harriman, Charles W. Davis, A. B. Hunt, all of Seattle, and Cleo Davis and R. J. Mahoney, deceased.

BLIND PIGS ARE IN BAD

OFFICERS MAKE A RAID AND PROMINENT CITIZENS HURRY TO COVER—ABANDONED STILL IS LOCATED BY CONSTABLE

ALBANY, Sept. 26.—Benton county officials raided a blind pig camp just across the river from here yesterday evening, securing two barrels of beer and a case of whiskey. A large number of Albany men were at the place at the time of the raid, and the way they scattered through the dense brush was very much like the scattering of a flock of quail. Transportation to and from the blind pig was managed by means of a gasoline launch, and it is said five trips were necessary to bring back all the patrons of the place after the liquor had been confiscated.

Constable John Catlin, who is also deputy sheriff for Benton county, discovered a recently deserted whiskey still just across the Willamette river from Albany on the Benton county side, recently. In company with John Gordon he was searching in the heavy timber below the railroad bridge for evidence of bootlegging when the still was discovered. It was located in a secluded spot, and had the appearance of having been used within a week or ten days.

SACRAMENTO, Sept. 26.—The democrats adjourned their convention here at 12:40 this morning, leaving open the question of nominating presidential electors by petition.

Caminetti has completed the state central committee appointments. The committee will organize to select a chairman in San Francisco Saturday. J. O. Davis will be a candidate against De Witt, and, as the Bell forces have been completely routed, Davis is likely to win.

PROSECUTOR TELLS OF THE DOG CASE

"There is no law in Oregon providing for the punishment of owners of vicious dogs, but a person who has suffered damages as a result of the acts of a dog may recover damages in court. Whether there is a city ordinance giving an officer authority to kill a vicious dog I am not informed."

Thusly did District Attorney Kuykendall make reply this morning to the insinuation that he had not performed his duty when he offered Wednesday no encouragement of redress to Mrs. Phillip C. Wilson, who complained that a dog had bitten her son.

It appears that the owner of the dog is Arthur Wallen, at present confined in the county jail on a charge of incest. His daughter is under arrest in Los Angeles, awaiting the arrival there of Sheriff Barnes, who is on his way south to bring her back. A damage suit against Wallen would probably not result in the recovery of any money for the very same reason that it would be impossible to get blood out of a turnip.
