HURSTING OF TUBE ON THE DESTROYER WALKER RESULTS IN THE DEATH OF OFFICER AND FIVE BLUEJACKETS

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### County Prisoners in Closed Quarters Now

Action of Arthur Wallen in Threatening an Officer Results in the Outer Door Being Closed

As a result of unbecoming conduct on the part of Arthur Wallen, the outer door of the county jail has been ordered closed, and concessions heretofore granted prisoners have been curtailed. Instead of being allowed to receive visitors at the inner door of the jail, permission must now be secured at the office of the sheriff in order to talk with prisoners in the here. It is claimed that Wallen last night threatened to kill Deputy Sheriff John Schallack. It appears that the prisoner was out of the jail to get some wood, with the officer standing guard. He approached the officer, and, shaking his fist in Schallack's face, said: "I'll get out of this yet, and when I do I'll kill you." The prisoner was rushed back into the jail, and confined in the tank. This morning, Mrs. Wallen, with the aid of a man who recently served thirty days in the jail on a larceny charge, attempted to hold a conversation with her husband, but she was seen and ordered to leave the vicinity of the county bastille. Wallen is confined in the county jail on a charge of incest. He has not yet been given a hearing.

### Allied Powers are to Fight the Turks

Bulgaria, Servia and Greece are Rapidly Mobilizing Troops With a View of Attacking Turkey

VIENNA, Oct. 1.—The Turkish government has ordered Greek merchantmen out of Turkish waters. Turkey, Bulgaria, Servia and Greece are rapidly mobilizing troops. Montenegro is already on a war footing. It is reported that the allies are preparing to land troops on the Aegean coast of Turkey. An Albanian dispatch says that Montenegrans have massacred thirty Turks, defeating a corps. Following the report from Constantinople that the Bulgarian minister had been recalled, almost a panic occurred on the bourse here. Stocks took a decided slump.

Servia Angry PARIS, Oct. 1.—A dispatch from Constantinople says that Nendovitch, the Servian minister, had given Turkey two days within which to release a train load of ammunition which has been held up. Otherwise Servia will declare war.

Loans Refused PARIS, Oct. 1.—The French government has requested French banks to refuse to advance money to any of the Balkan states. This may discourage the war plans.

### Roosevelt Finally Cuts Out "I" in Campaign Speeches

Bull Moose Candidate Completes His Swing Around the Country and Will Now go Home to Play a Few Games of Tennis and Rest Up for Awhile

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 1.—Theodore Roosevelt, erstwhile president and willing to try the job again, entered the National Capital today on the home stretch of the most comprehensive campaigning tour ever undertaken by a presidential candidate. By the time he reaches New York tomorrow the Bull Moose leader will have covered something over 9,000 miles and have made 300 speeches to perhaps 10,000,000 citizens, in advocacy of the progressive principles for which he is fighting. The 300 speeches does not count the mere rear-end-of-train talks, of which there were scores. It does not give an idea of the typically Roosevelt strenuousness of the trip, of an enthusiasm which never waned, keen insight into local conditions, an alertness and versatility that transformed what were about eight basic topics for speechmaking into almost new addresses in city after city. Thirty-seven states have been traversed by the Bull Moose leader. One month ago tomorrow he began his swing around the circle by an excursion into Connecticut. Thence he swung westward, zigzagging up and down the coast, and thence eastward and through the South, returning along the Atlantic coast. "What I am anxious to do now," said the Colonel today, "is to get back to Oyster Bay, play a few sets of tennis, take a ride or a walk, and then I'm ready again."
