CRIPPLE TO GIVE LEG TO SAVE GIRL

GARY, Ind., Oct. 1.—A surgical operation that is believed to be without precedent in America will be performed today at the Gary general hospital.

William Rugh, a crippled newsboy, will give his useless leg in order that skin may be grafted on the burned body of Ethel Smith, an 18-year-old victim of a motorcycle collision.

Fifty per cent of the cuticle on Miss Smith's body was lost, and unless new skin is procured she will not live. Hearing of the girl's misfortune, Rugh, several days ago, offered to part with his leg.

Miss Smith and Rugh will be placed on adjoining operating tables. An anesthetic will be given them. The surgeons will cut off long strips of skin from Rugh's leg, and will immediately apply it to the legs of the girl. Following the skin-grafting operation the surgeons will amputate Rugh's leg just below the joint.

Rugh was busy at his news stand last night breaking in his "pal," Jim, a deaf and dumb man, who will manage his business in the meantime.

Rugh's father, William Rugh, of Cherryville, Ore., has been informed of the intended operation.

TACOMA WOMAN SEEKS HONORS IN BIG MILL

FEMALE CANDIDATE FOR THE LEGISLATURE FROM PIERCE COUNTY IS IN THE FIELD—HER FRIENDS ARE ENTHUSIASTIC

TACOMA, Wash., Oct. 1.—In Dr. Nedra Jolison Crooke, one of the city's leading club women, Tacoma has the first woman candidate for the state legislature in Pierce county and in the state, so far as known.

Mrs. Crooke has for years taken an active interest in civic affairs, and was among the leaders in the successful campaign for woman's suffrage in this state. She filed as a candidate for the progressive nomination in the Thirty-seventh Legislative District, in which is located her home, and landed the nomination without trouble, and is now conducting an aggressive campaign, at which parlor meetings in the homes of her district are a feature, and expects to win at the November election.

There is every indication, her friends say, that she will have the honor of being the first woman member of the legislature of the state of Washington.

WEST IS AFTER SOME DRUGGISTS

GOVERNOR DECLARES THAT SOME PHARMACIES IN STATE ARE BUT LITTLE BETTER THAN BLIND PIGS

SALEM, Oct. 1.—Governor West will communicate with members of the State Board of Pharmacy to determine what legislation may be brought about to curtail the sale of liquor in "blind pigs" which are conducted in connection with drug stores.

The executive says that there are some druggists who sell liquor in violation of the law, but that these are largely in the minority, and he is satisfied the great majority of druggists will co-operate in securing legislation which will ward off such law violations.

He suggests that inasmuch as the state furnishes a license to pharmacists before they can conduct business, legislation should be enacted which would give the state board the power to deprive any pharmacist of a license for violating the law.

This timber is upon portions of the W. 1/2 of the W. 1/2 of the NE 1/4, and the E. 1/2 of the NW 1/4, of the NW 1/4, and all of the SW 1/4, of the NW 1/4, except that portion allotted to Wise Johnson, No. 275, which embraces the following description: Beginning 5 chains south of the 1/4 corner between sections 22 and 23, thence east 17 chains, thence north 25 chains, thence west 17 chains, thence south 25 chains to place of beginning, all in Section 23, Township 34 South, Range 7 East, Willamette Meridian, Oregon. The Oregon Eastern railroad runs through the northwestern corner of the proposed sale area.
