The federal court opened at 9 o'clock this morning. There were fifty defendants present. Daniel Brophy was the only one missing. He is in Brooklyn with a broken leg.

McManigal is being guarded by six secret service officers. There are twelve bailiffs in the court room. The building is crowded.

The court discharged Irwin, Patrick Ryan and Cavanaugh. The government elected to try the remaining forty-seven defendants on fifty-five counts, five charging conspiracy, thirty-four the illegal transportation of dynamite and sixteen involving nitroglycerine. Forty-five counts were without specific data, and were eliminated.

Clancy and Twitmore waived arraignment and pleaded not guilty.

YOUTHS DODGE RHODES' PRIZE

BUT ONE ENTRY HAS BEEN MADE FOR THE SCHOLARSHIPS LEFT BY THE FAMOUS SOUTH AFRICAN MILLIONAIRE

EUGENE, Oct. 1.—A chance to live three years in Europe, with \$1,500 of Cecil Rhodes' money to spend each year, apparently makes small appeal to the young men of Oregon. A Rhodes scholarship at Oxford university is to be granted as the prize for an examination to be held October 15 and 16, and everything is in readiness except the rush of applicants which failed to materialize.

Albany and Dallas colleges notified President Campbell of the State university, who is chairman of the Oregon Rhodes scholarship committee, that they would send no candidates this year, and the students at Eugene and the other university towns seem in no hurry to enter the contest.

The deadlock was finally broken by George Stewart, Jr., a student of McMinnville college, who placed his name at the head of the list.

The fact that Oxford requires some knowledge of Greek of its students keeps out many young men who might otherwise be candidates.

Business suit and a frock coat. That one gray suit was sadly worn and wrinkled and creased and dirty, as if its wearer ought to have been after such a trip, but the Colonel isn't much on style. His black felt sombrero was almost equally marked with wear and travel.

Here was the usual Rooseveltian program, day by day:

Arise at 7 o'clock.
Shake hands with a crowd and make a two minute talk, perhaps in the middle of his breakfast, at 8 o'clock.

Talk on politics with local Bull Moosers, interspersed with perhaps a couple of set speeches.

Grab luncheon at 1 o'clock.
More speeches, and in between times rest. (Rest, according to the Colonel's notion, consists of reading such books as the History of the Second Empire, the French Revolution, or some of the French essayists—in their own language.)

Dinner, say, about 7.

Moore speeches, probably up to 11 o'clock, and then to bed.

Of course, on such a varied trill as the Colonel has taken the above program wasn't always called out. Generally it was about twice as strenuous. It should also be mentioned that the Colonel sandwiched in daily a personal letter to Mrs. Roosevelt, handed his regular mail, read the newspapers and mapped out additional work.

The Bull Moosers regularly sprung about half a dozen stock jokes or "brighteners," but they were sprung with just as much spontaneity yesterday in the South as they were in Connecticut nearly a month ago. And they always fetched the crowd. One favorite was for the Colonel to shoot the little ones away from the rear of the train, and then romary confidentially to the crowd in that squeaky falsetto the ex-president always adopts when he is humorous: "You

know, I don't want to lose any little Bull Moosers."

Throughout the Colonel avoided the "I" wherever possible. It was "we progressives" mostly.

Roosevelt never was an orator, but those who have been associated with him for years say that he never spoke before with the warmth, the conviction and the ability he showed on the "swing around the circle." It was his intense earnestness that held his audiences. Of all the receptions, he got only two or three that might be classed as tepid—and the two worst of these were at Oskaloosa, Iowa, and Pueblo, Colo. Most effective of all his appeals were those made direct to the veterans of the civil war—and the Colonel generally chose one gray-haired veteran of the audience, and spoke to him directly, appealing now and then for confirmation of his statements as to conditions in the 60's being comparable to those of the present day.

Dinner time on the Colonel's private car—he had the Mayflower, generally used by President Taft, while the newspaper cabinet, as he always termed them, were bunked in another private car next to his—was an institution. Roosevelt likes a hearty meal, and he likes to linger over an after-dinner cup of tea and discuss everything under the sun, from the making of wall paper to the habits of Texas Americans. And in that discussion everybody joins.

One joke the Colonel admitted was on himself transpired at a Nebraska town. He was addressing an audience of school children.

"I can talk to the boys," Roosevelt said, "but I've only one girl."

A newspaper man called the Colonel's attention later to the fact that the Roosevelt family actually included two daughters, Mrs. Alice Longworth and Miss Ethel.

"By George," the Colonel ejaculated, "I was thinking about my little granddaughter when I said that. Now look here, if you boys publish that and put me in bed with my family, why I'll just disown you."

RICH SAID TO BE AT LIBERTY

UNCONFIRMED REPORT HAS IT THAT THE FORMER KLAMATH FALLS SHOE MAN IS OUT ON BONDS OF \$1,000

It was reported in the city today that L. B. Rich had been released this afternoon from the Josephine county jail. It was said that a private message had been received here to that effect, but this could not be confirmed.

C. F. Stone, attorney for Rich, stated this afternoon that he had received no word from Grants Pass concerning the release of his client.

"The money for Rich's bond, \$1,000, should have arrived in Grants Pass today," said Mr. Stone, "and it is probable that I will receive word at any time now that he has been released from custody."

MOTHER SEEKS TO FREE BERNICE

APPLICATION FOR A WRIT OF HABEAS CORPUS IS BEING HEARD BEFORE JUDGE BENSON THIS AFTERNOON

Judge Benson was occupied most of today in the matter of the writ of habeas corpus started by the mother to secure the release from custody of Bernice Wallen. Three witnesses were examined. They were Sheriff Barnes, District Attorney Kuykendall and Bernice Wallen.

Practically every important question asked by C. C. Brower, attorney for Mrs. Wallen, was objected to by District Attorney Kuykendall, and the objections sustained by the court.

It was confidently believed at the court house that in the event of the writ being granted the girl would immediately be served with a subpoena as a witness against her father, and again taken into custody upon failure to furnish bonds for her appearance in court at the proper time.

The little girl, recently brought back here from Texas, appeared in court in custody of Sheriff Barnes. She is being cared for at the Barnes' residence.

Judge Benson, after hearing the arguments of the attorneys, announced that he would pass on the matter tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock.
