AN ALASKA CONCERN PAYS BIG RETURNS

TACOMA, Wash., Oct. 4.—Although capitalized for but \$50,000, the John J. Seanon company of Nome paid dividends in either 1907 or 1908 to the amount of \$40,000, or 80 per cent of its capital stock, according to the admission made upon the witness stand today by John H. Bullock, president of the concern, on trial here, with Charles E. Houston of the Pacific Coast Coal company, charged with

conspiracy to defraud the government in coal contracts for coal at Alaskan army posts.

Bullock, during a severe cross-examination conducted by Special Assistant Attorney General Townsend, declared at first that the company did not declare any such dividends, but later said that he had misunderstood Townsend as to the year mentioned, and that his concern had in 1908 paid the sum mentioned.
