### TURKISH BARRACKS ARE BURNED TO THE GROUND

Inhabitants of an Island Owned by Turkey Declare for a Republic. Two Armies of a Quarter of a Million Men Will Be Ready for the Field by Monday, Is the Prediction Now Made

Armies to Be Ready

The Serbian minister has demanded that the sultan surrender the conditions of war which have been refused. Unless the demand is met within twenty-four hours diplomatic relations will be severed.

## ARRESTS OF TWO MEN EXPECTED

### IT IS BELIEVED THAT BRIER AND ANDERSON HAVE BEEN DETAINED AT QUARANTINE AT THE CANADIAN BORDER

Although no word has been received here announcing their capture, it is practically certain that Brier and Anderson will be taken into custody within the next day or two.

It was ascertained Friday that shipments of stock into Canada are delayed at least a week at the international boundary line, and this, it is believed, accounts for the fact that the Vancouver officers have not made the arrests. It is supposed that Brier and Anderson, with their horses, are held at quarantine at one of the points of entry along the Canadian line.

Sheriff Barnes is now on the trail of the two men, and in the morning C. F. Stone, who is the attorney for the creditors of the two fugitives, will leave to assist the sheriff in tracing the men. Mr. Stone will attend a meeting of the fish and game commission in Portland on Monday, and will then go on north.

## HORSE FAMINE IS IMMINENT

### UNCLE SAM'S CAVALRY IS UP AGAINST SERIOUS PROBLEM BECAUSE OF THE SHORTAGE OF HORSES

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 5.—Uncle Sam's cavalry is up against the problem of another "horse famine."

The Second and Fourth cavalry regiments, which have just returned to the United States from the Philippines, have had to be entirely remounted because a disease made it impossible for the regiments to bring back their mounts from the islands.

The remount stations which supply horses for the cavalry arm have been almost stripped bare of serviceable mounts, and if there should be any additional demands for horses the government might have to go out and buy horses in the open market. Owing to the activity of the Mexican rebels on the border, the demands for cavalry have been large.

## ANOTHER FAKE STORY IS NAILED BY U.S. MARSHAL

### REPORT THAT WHEELER HAD SKIPPED IN DENIED

Former Deputy Sheriff and Witness in the Graft Case Is Now in Alberta, But Will Return to This City in About a Month—He Is in Communication With Friends in This City

Friends of James H. Wheeler are highly indignant over a story which appeared in the morning paper in effect that Mr. Wheeler has "skipped" the country in order to escape appearing as a witness against men who were recently indicted by the county grand jury on graft charges. Deputy United States Marshal Beatty, who is credited with having furnished the paper with the facts on which the article was based, declared this morning that he had not given the paper any such information.

"I told the Northwestern reporter last night that Wheeler was in Canada," said Mr. Beatty. "I did not say that Wheeler intended staying in the far north. All of the information that I have concerning the whereabouts of Wheeler came from the sheriff's office here. I do not enjoy having my statements so twisted as to make a liar out of me."

As a matter of fact, Wheeler has been in constant communication with friends in this city. He is not in British Columbia, as stated by the morning paper, but is in Alberta. His last letter to Deputy Sheriff John Schallock was from Hardisty, Alta., and was received here September 28.

In this letter Mr. Wheeler writes that he will probably return to this city in about a month. Omitting matters of business in which Mr. Wheeler is engaged with Mr. Schallock, the letter is as follows:

"Hardisty, Alta., Sept. 24, 1919. Mr. John Schallock, Klamath Falls: "Dear Friend—Well John, I have got about 900 miles up in Canada. Have seen some very fine wheat country, the best I have ever seen. They raise from 40 to 50 bushels of wheat to the acre and from 80 to 110 bushels of oats to the acre. ## MORE BEER IS MADE IN U. S.

### NEARLY 8,000,745,000 GALLONS OF THE FLUID PRODUCED IN THE WORLD IN 1916, AND MOST OF IT CONSUMED

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 5.—Nearly 8,000,745,000 gallons of beer was the world's production in the year 1916, according to a report to the state department from Consul Heingartner at Liege, Belgium, quoting figures from the "Action Economique." Of this enormous amount 7,925,000,000 gallons were consumed during the same period.

The United States occupied first place among the beer-producing countries, with an output of 1,908,010,277. Germany was second, with 1,702,666,460 gallons, manufactured by 13,186 breweries. Great Britain ranked third and Austria-Hungary is fourth.

## FREAK DEVICES ARE REMOVED

### TO MAKE TRAVELING ON RAILROAD TRAINS SAFER, INVENTORS RESUME THE INTERSTATE COMMERCE COMMISSION

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 5.—Hundreds of models of freak devices to make railroad travel more safe are being tumbled from the dusty shelves of the interstate commerce commission to its new building. These models were submitted during an ancient inquiry of the commission into the use of block signals. Some are practical, some freakish, and some utterly worthless.

Among the models is a passenger car, guaranteed not to telescope in a wreck. The car ends are sharply curved, instead of square. The inventor forgot to calculate what would happen to passengers if the car was shunted to one side and avoided telescoping. With the many models is a small mountain of blue prints, ink drawings and photographs—all adding to Uncle Sam's scrap heap.

## FAVORS PRIVACY FOR YOUNGSTERS

### NEW METHOD OF HANDLING DELINQUENTS IS ADVOCATED BY JUVENILE JUDGE IN THE PORTLAND COURTS

PORTLAND, Oct. 5.—New methods of handling juvenile delinquency are discussed in the report of the Juvenile Court for September. The officers give figures to show that far more cases were dealt with out of court than in. While 43 young offenders faced the judge at the bar of justice during the month, 74 others were dealt with in various ways by Juvenile Officer White and his assistants without being given a public trial.

The method of settling the cases out of court is recommended. The delinquent children are taken to their homes by the officers and there the matter is arranged so that no publicity is given it. For the first offense the child is shielded from disgrace, and is not given the opportunity to pose as a hero before his companions for having been in court.

Of the 43 children who were brought into court for trial, 26 were boys and 17 girls. Five more were there for second or subsequent offenses. Seven had committed burglary, four larceny and four had been guilty of acts of immorality. Nine were sentenced to the Frazier home, seven to other charitable institutions, one to the reform school, two to the Home of the Good Shepherd and the others were paroled or given their freedom on probation.

## BOURNE WILL BE CANDIDATE

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 5.—After a petition signed by almost 16,000 voters had been filed with Secretary of State Ben W. Olcott, Jonathan Bourne, Jr., today accepted the independent nomination for re-election as United States senator. He will run as the "popular government" candidate.

## AMERICANS DIE FIGHTING REBELS IN NICARAGUA

### THE INSURGENT GENERAL EN-TRENCHES HIS FORCES

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 5.—Four Americans were killed and six were wounded in a battle with Nicaraguan rebels at Coyotepe yesterday. About 160 federals were also killed. News of the battle was received here today in a cablegram from M. Chamorro, minister of foreign affairs of Nicaragua.

General Zeledón's rebel army was routed and Zeledón was captured near Masaya. He was wounded and died soon after his capture.

Americans under Admiral Southland and Nicaraguan federal troops participated. The rebel casualties are unknown. Zeledón refused Southland's demand to surrender, and entrenched his army on a hill near Coyotepe. The Americans and federals deployed on two sides, the rebels fighting desperately. Two hundred of the federals were wounded.

San Francisco, Oct. 5.—A fire which broke out at 4 o'clock this morning in the Pacific Oil and Lead works, is being fought by the whole fire department. Twenty men narrowly escaped with their lives from the rapidly spreading flames.

It is estimated that the loss will exceed \$100,000. The same structure was destroyed in 1892, when for five days the fire department battled with the flames.
