WASHINGTON, Oct. 5.—The National Capital's aristocratic residence section is just beginning to show signs of awakening from a four months' sleep, with the return to the city of the vanguard of social leaders who have been summering in the mountains, at the seashore and abroad. Washington's bou ton section during the summer months is the most deserted and gloomy of any city in the country. Palatial residences along Connecticut and Massachusetts avenues for miles are boarded up and guarded while the owners retire to the summer homes in cooler climates. Many of the residences of the multi-millionaires, such as Thos. R. Walsh, John R. McLean, Lars Anderson, are occupied probably about two months in each year.

An unusual demand this season for large residences for occupancy permanently or for the coming social season is reported by real estate dealers here.

### AN OLD MAN GETS OUT OF THE PEN

GOVERNOR WEST PARDONS MAN CHARGED WITH KILLING THE BETRAYER OF HIS DAUGHTERS IN COQUILLE.

SALEM, Oct. 5.—Governor West has granted a pardon to W. R. Foote, the aged father who shot and killed Charles Wilcox at Coquille for betraying one of his daughters and attempting to betray a second. The oldest girl was only 17 years old.

While Foote was received at the penitentiary over a week ago, he never became a convict in the sense that other prisoners have. The governor immediately placed him on parole awaiting such time as he could secure further particulars in connection with the case. This information being received, the governor immediately announced his pardon for the man who, after attempting and failing to get protection from the officers, took the law in his own hands in defense of his home circle.

At the first trial of Foote, the jury hung, six to six. At the second trial Foote pleaded guilty to manslaughter and was sentenced to one to fifteen years. He will now return to his aged wife, whose intense grief, when she learned that her second daughter had been betrayed by Wilcox, decided the old man to take his gun.
