NEW YORK, Oct. 7.—It is generally regarded as a case of "shut your eyes and take your choice," when the New York Giants and the Boston Red Sox meet tomorrow afternoon to play the opening game of the 1912 World's championship series. Experts who had been figuring on the comparative strength of the two teams since it became apparent weeks ago that they would fight for the title, arrived at the conclusion finally that only two points were left on which to base the selection of a favorite.

One point of vantage was allotted to each team. The Giants possessed the confidence gained by participation in last year's world's series. The Red Sox were favored because they out-gamed the giant-killing Athletics through a long, hard season. Aside from these two points, there was thought to be little choice, the two teams generally being regarded as evenly matched.

Examination of the two teams through their records and through scientific study failed to produce a balance in favor of either. The Giants, according to averages, possessed superior hitting, base running and scoring ability, and the Red Sox, according to averages, were stronger fielders, but the difference between the two was in each instance hardly appreciable. Boston fans, for instance, contend when the Giants' superiority in batting average is mentioned, that the Red Sox were up against better pitching than the Giants encountered. A more satisfactory method of comparison was found in a close scrutiny of the play of individual members of the teams.

Here again an even break resulted. Carrigan, of Boston, is usually rated as a better batsman than Big Chief Meyers, but Cady, who invariably catches when Smokey Joe Wood works, is not valued as highly. A balance obtains there. Wood and Matty, speed and skill, were thought to be about evenly matched. Collins, though not so brilliant as Marquard, was regarded as more steady and reliable. Bedient, like Toscani, a spitball pitcher, was thought to be more seasoned if not so flashy as Big Jeff.

Merkle and Doyle, at first and second, were conceded to be as much better than Stahl and Verkes, as Wagner and Gardner were reckoned superior to Fletcher and Hersog. The Boston infield as a whole was thought to possess greater defensive strength, being steadier than the Giant four, and the quartet being a more smoothly working machine. But the New York infielders possess higher batting averages than their Boston rivals. Again a toss up.

As for outfields, Boston was generally given the preference. Lewis, Speaker and Hooper form one of the most wonderful fielding trios that has ever played the game, according to all critics. In addition they are a good hitting bunch. Speaker especially being a terrific swatter. Opposed to them were to be Murray, Snodgrass and Becker. Red John Murray, at times a sensational fielder and vicious hitter, was not to be heavily banked on because of his tendency to be erratic. At that, he stands head and shoulders above Becker and Snodgrass. Man for man, and as a combination, the Giant outfielders rank below the Red Sox gardeners.

Any advantage that Boston might have in actual playing strength was thought to be counterbalanced by the managerial ability of John McGraw, the Giant boss. His generalship has always been of a uniformly high order, and critics ranked him above Jake Stahl. Although Stahl, aided and abetted by McAleer, was recognized as an able general, and one who could produce results.

Summing it all up, the two teams are regarded as about evenly matched as to real, game-winning ability. Critics compiled statistics and reckoned individual merit without reaching a decision for either team. The question was an open one, and guesswork availed nothing. The whole problem seemed to be one of how the teams would act under fire. The Giants, having been through one world's series, are confident. The Red Sox, having defeated the team that won the championship from the Giants, are likewise confident.

Wednesday's game will be played at Boston, the two teams spending the night in New York and traveling to the Hub in the morning. A big reception awaits them.
