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SOCIETY OFFERS PUPILS PRIZES

TO ENCOURAGE LOVE OF OUR COUNTRY, CONTEST ON ESSAYS ON WAR OF INDEPENDENCE IS INAUGURATED

The Oregon Society of the Sons of American Revolution offers prizes totaling \$100 to the pupils of the public schools of the state of Oregon for essays on subjects connected with our war for independence.

One prize of \$25, one of \$15 and one of \$10 will be awarded for the first, second and third best essays, respectively, written by pupils of the high schools of the state on one of the following subjects:

- 1—The Confederation and the Constitution.
- 2—Women of the American Revolution.

3—Benedict Arnold.
One prize of \$10, two of \$5 each and ten prizes of medals of the Society of the Sons of the American Revolution will be awarded for the best essays, written by grade pupils on any one of the following subjects:

- 1—Battle of Saratoga and its Effects.
- 2—John Paul Jones.
- 3—Valley Forge.

Each grade pupil winning a cash prize will also receive a medal.

The essays are limited to 3,000 each, must be written in the student's own handwriting on one side only of the paper and accompanied by a certificate from the writer's teacher, stating that the writer is a pupil in a designated class, and that the teacher believes the essay to be the pupil's own unaided work.

The essays must be signed by the writer, giving also his or her post-office address (including county). They should be forwarded to Harold C. Stephens, chairman of the committee, 310 Wilcox building, Portland, Oregon, and should reach their destination not later than January 1, 1913. Essays not complying with these conditions will be rejected.

In awarding these prizes the committee will be governed by consideration of:

- 1—Originality.
- 2—Accuracy of statement.
- 3—Manner of treatment.
- 4—Orthography, syntax and punctuation.
- 5—Neatness and legibility.

These prizes are offered to encourage love of our country and the study of history.

SPRECKLES PAID FOR A CAMPAIGN

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 7.—Colonel Hannan, La Follette's secretary, testified before the senatorial campaign probe committee today. He said that the total receipts for La Follette's pre-convention campaign fund were \$63,965. The expenditures amounted to \$4 less. Charles Crane contributed \$22,500. Clifford Pinchot, Amos Pinchot and Congressman Kent contributed \$10,000 each. La Follette contributed \$1,600. Later Mr. Crane gave \$9,174 more.

"Rudolph Spreckles largely paid all of the expenses incidental to the La Follette campaign in California," said the witness.

plea to guilty. Sentence was deferred. Clark then joined Orrie McManigal in the United States marshal's office.

The other defendants expressed the greatest surprise at the action of Clark. They expressed the opinion that the change in the plea was the result of District Attorney Miller's denunciation of Clark Saturday, when the prosecutor charged that Clark had been the leader in twelve dynamiting outrages in and about Cleveland.

The defendants, all labor leaders, seemed uneasy in court this morning. They eyed each other suspiciously.

No one is allowed to see Clark. "Clark has pleaded guilty," said District Attorney Miller. "How and why is his own business. If others are to follow his example it will be known when they take the stand before the court, and not before."

The district attorney continued his statement. He detailed the story of the Los Angeles explosion, calling Jim McNamara "one of the bloodiest murderers in history." He also described dynamitings in Salt Lake and Pittsburgh.

UNREST OF THE RUSSIANS CAUSES MUCH ANXIETY

STATISTICS SHOW THAT NUMBER OF STRIKERS IS INCREASING RAPIDLY — MANUFACTURERS ARE WORRIED

ST. PETERSBURG, Oct. 7.—The growing political and economic unrest in Russia is emphasized in a bulletin published today by the Union of Manufacturers of Moscow.

Carefully compiled figures as given showing that whereas in 1911 only 103,000 workers, 5 1/2 per cent of all workers, took part in strikes, during the first six months of this year the number of strikers was \$14,000, or 31 per cent of the entire working class. Of this number \$15,000 struck work for political purposes, it is declared. St. Petersburg alone furnished 200,000 strikers in this period.

MARSHAL ARRESTS A DRUNKEN INDIAN

EN ROUTE TO THIS CITY BEATY MEETS AN INDIAN WHO HAD JUST BEEN RELEASED FROM COUNTY JAIL

When Deputy United States Marshal Beatty was returning to this city from Chiloquin Sunday he met Joseph Wilson, an Indian, who had just been released from the county jail, where he had been held as a witness in a case in which a white man was charged with selling him whiskey. The Indian was in a sad state of intoxication, and was brought to this city, where he was turned over to Edson Watson, superintendent of the Klamath reservation.

The Indian expressed great indignation when ordered to come back here, and immediately after arrival wanted to fight with the federal officer. He was easily disarmed, however.

VENIEMEN TRY TO ESCAPE DUTY

NEW YORK, Oct. 7.—Before starting the Becker trial, Justice Goff impaneled a special grand jury to probe the police and the underworld. He questioned 50 veniemen before selecting a jury. Most of the veniemen sought to escape service.

TAX PENALTY COMES TODAY

The last opportunity to pay 1911 taxes without penalty attached was given today. When the office of the sheriff closes at 5 o'clock this afternoon there will be a penalty of 10 per cent added to the amount due, and every month thereafter there will be added 1 per cent.

The last few days have been busy ones for the force in the sheriff's office, receiving the money of belated taxpayers who were anxious to avoid the penalty.

WOMEN COMING INTO THEIR OWN

VIENNA AUTHORITIES GIVE LICENSES TO FEMALE TAXICAB DRIVER AND FEMALE RACING JOCKEY

VIENNA, Oct. 7.—Slowly but surely women are coming into their own in Austria-Hungary. The Vienna authorities have granted a license to an officer's widow to drive a taxicab, and the Hungarian Jockey Club has given a riding license to a trainer's daughter. The latter is Miss Elsie Bulford, daughter of a once famous English jockey, Sam Bulford, who is now living in Roumania.

INDIANAPOLIS, Oct. 7.—James Whitcomb Riley was showered with letters and telegrams today, it being his 59th birthday. He remained at his home.

"I am thankful to everyone for their kindness to me," he said. "I have not an enemy in the world. My health is better than it was a year ago."

LABOR LEADERS NOW IN SESSION

SAN DIEGO, Oct. 7.—The convention of the State Labor Federation opened here today. The delegates predict the election of D. P. Haggerty of the machinists union of San Francisco as president; Paul Scharenberg of the sailors union of San Francisco as secretary. W. A. Engle of Los Angeles is opposing Haggerty.

The naming of Andrew Gallagher to be delegate to the general convention at Rochester is expected. It is also expected that the convention will adopt a resolution of confidence in the iron workers now on trial in Indianapolis.

INSANITY FEAR CAUSES SUICIDE

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 7.—Mrs. R. M. Blum, fearing that she was about to become insane, saturated her clothes with gasoline and then set them on fire. She was burned to a crisp. The fire did but little other damage.
