SEA SCOUTS TO BE ORGANIZED

BOY SCOUT MOVEMENT ON LAND
IS TO BE DUPLICATED BY AN
ORGANIZATION TO TAKE CARE
OF THE OCEANS

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 11.—
Leaders in a new movement known as
the "Sea Scouts" are trying to inter-
est navy department officials in the
work of the organization which origi-
nated in Boston this summer. The
idea of the Sea Scouts as explained
to the department is closely allied
with the Boy Scout movement, but
teaches and practices at sea many
traits that are taught the Boy Scouts
in the field. In effect the organiza-
tion forms the maritime section of
the Boy Scouts of America, and is
under the charge of Captain De Witt
Coffman, U. S. N., commandant of
the Boston navy yard, Lieutenant W.
R. Furlong, U. S. N., commanding the
U. S. S. Chicago, and A. A. Carey of
Boston.

An officer of the navy connected
with the new movement says that by
reason of the life the Sea Scouts must
lead, and the various duties they
must perform, together with the
pleasures the water offers, the move-
ment is expected to afford in some
respects a much better opportunity
for imparting and practicing the man-
ly virtues than even the Boy Scout
movement does. Organizers of the
Sea Scouts expect the activities to ex-
tend to other cities along the Atlantic
coast in the course of a few years.

At Boston a schooner has been fit-
ted up with berths for twenty boys
for cruises of two weeks for each lot.
The lots are from 14 to 16 years of
age, and it is they who man the
schooner and sail her. A responsible
man of excellent character and sea-
manlike qualities is the captain. Dis-
cipline, cleanliness and etiquette are
attained by conducting the routine on
board the schooner in a strictly man-
o-war fashion.

ENGINEER MAKES SPEEDY ADVANCE

CORVALLIS, Oct. 11.—The quick
rise of two of the engineering stu-
dents from O. A. C. College of En-
gineering is a notable indication of
what application under proper in-
structions can do. Fred McMillan,
Salem, who graduated last June from
the electrical department, is in the
testing department of the General
Electric company, at Schenectady, N.
Y., and Scott P. Hart, Albany, has
just been made resident engineer for
the district between Corvallis and
Honolulu for the P. E. & E. railway.
Mr. McMillan was made manager of
the Student Engineer, a monthly
magazine published at the college, af-
ter a year's service as assistant man-
ager. He was secretary of the En-
gineering Association, a member of

the local branch of the American In-
stitute of Electrical Engineering, the
Jeffersonian Literary Society and the
Gamma Delta Phi fraternity. He was
a member of the Student Council,
which has charge of student disci-
pline, and was captain of Company G.
Scott Hart had attended college
but a year and a half when he with-
drew on account of lack of funds, and
obtained employment as chairman for
the P. E. & E. In six months he
worked himself up through the posi-
tions of rodman, levelman, transit
man and engineer to his present posi-
tion of responsibility, where he has
complete charge of all the engineer-
ing work of the company in this dis-
trict. He plans to return to college
later and obtain his degree as civil
engineer.

MINISTERS ARE GETTING SCARCE

UNITED STATES BUREAU OF EDU-
CATION MAKE REPORT WHICH
CAUSES COUNTRY CHURCHES
TO RAISE SALARIES

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 11.—
A remarkable decline in the number
of Protestant ministers graduated
from the universities of the country
is shown in a current report of the
United States Bureau of Education.

"It is plain," says the report, "that
educated men no longer seek the
cloth as they did when the nation was
younger. It may mean much or little
that the percentage of ministers
among the graduates of typical col-
leges has declined from 60 to 70 per
cent to less than 10 per cent."

An examination of the figures col-
lected at the close of the nineteenth
century from thirty-seven represen-
tative colleges discloses the fact that
the ministry takes between 5 and 6
per cent of the university graduates,
which marks the lowest point for
that profession during the two and
one-half centuries of American col-
lege history. Between the years of
1896 and 1900, only 565 students
were graduated from thirty-seven
representative colleges and univer-
sities, or 5.9 per cent of the total
number graduated, which was over
14,000.
