CARPENTERS DIE BY TUBERCULOSIS

Prevalence of the Disease is Attributed
to the Dusty Shops in Which the Me-
chanics are Generally Employed

INDIANAPOLIS, Oct. 12.—Seven-
teen per cent of the deaths of car-
penters and their wives is caused by
tuberculosis, the most prevalent dis-
ease causing death among that pro-
fession, according to the report of the
United Brotherhood of Carpenters and
Joiners, which was submitted to the
convention at Washington this fall.
According to Frank Duffy, gen-
eral secretary of the organization, this
disease has made great inroads on
the carpenter's organization in spite
of efforts of the officials at the head
of the union to warn union men
against it. The prevalence of tuber-
culosis is attributed to dusty shops,
by Duffy. However, it was pointed
out to him that the life of a carpen-
ter is, in the main, an outdoor life.
"But the workman may grow care-
less," replied Duffy. "Working some-
times to the point of fatigue, subject-
ed to all kinds of weather, the out-
door carpenter may have a tendency
to pay too little attention to his
health. Pneumonia may develop and
tuberculosis in time follows. Pneu-
monia, some years ago, had a much
higher death rate among carpenters
than now, although the rate at present
is still considerable."
Some years ago Duffy wrote an ar-
ticle in the Carpenters' Journal, en-
titled "Captains of Death." Denom-
inating consumption as the captain of
death, he called pneumonia "the
king." The tendency of carpenters
to contract slight colds and to neg-
lect them was called to the attention
of the unionist. The carpenters' union
pays a death benefit on the
