Laughlin Discovered the Sunshine Mine

A Brother of Klamath Falls Liveryman Located the Richest Mine at High Grade

The richest gold mine at High Grade, the new gold camp located on the Oregon-California state line, 120 miles east of here, was located by Jack Laughlin of Klamath Falls in 1905. Laughlin owned many claims in the district, and disposed of his interest in the Sunshine for a few dollars. He considered the claim of little value at the time, and was pleased with his bargain when the sale was made. Little work was done on the Sunshine until last fall, when Charles Laughlin, a brother of Jack's, began prospecting the ground, and in a few days he located the bonanza pay streak from which has been taken rock assaying over \$20,000 per ton. Car load shipments have given returns of \$248 per ton. The men has been developed by a tunnel for a distance of 260 feet, gaining a depth of 80 feet.

In June of this year the mine which was peddled for a few dollars by Laughlin, was sold to Charles Fulton, a mining man of Los Angeles, for \$65,000. Mr. Fulton had previously bought adjoining claims, and at once consolidated all of his properties and organized the Sunshine High Grade Mining company. As officers of his company Mr. Fulton chose bankers and successful business men of Lakeview, Oregon, among whom are Felix Green, W. P. Heryford, J. D. Heryford, F. M. Miller, W. L. Thompson and B. X. Dawson, a mining man of Colorado and Nevada.

A portion of the Sunshine properties is under lease to miners who are working the ground on a royalty plan. The company received the richest part, and will determine the extent of the rich gold deposits by sinking a deep shaft this winter. The prospect is taken from the mine and will be treated in a stamp mill.

The company proposes to erect at the mine. The display of ore from High Grade which has been examined by over 1,000 people, has been placed in Mr. Capron's new office, opposite the American Bank and Trust company. Everyone is interested, especially miners and investors. To meet the expense of development this winter the Sunshine company is offering their stock at 25c per share, and from the interest manifested Mr. Fulton believes that the demand for the stock will be greater than the amount offered for sale.

Vast fortunes have been and are now being made by gold mining. Small investments in mining stocks frequently return enormous profits. Tonopah stocks are quite active, and the mines of that camp are unusually profitable now. Stock in eight of the leading mines there was sold at 25c per share, the selling price of Sunshine stock.

The present selling price of the stock of these mines is: Belmont \$10 per share, Tonopah Mining \$7, Tonopah Extension \$2.50; Montana Tonopah \$2.25, Halifax \$2, West End \$1.75, Tonopah Merger \$1.25. Here one has tremendous advance over the first selling price; besides these mines have paid millions in dividends.

According to the statements of successful mining men, High Grade has greater mineralized surface showings than either Tonopah, Goldfield or Cripple Creek, and the ore found in the Sunshine mine at shallow depth is surprisingly rich. Greater depth, it is claimed, will make this mine a sensational producer of gold, and those associated with it wealthy.
