FIRE FIGHTING ENGINES USEFUL

PENNSYLVANIA RAILROAD INTRO-
DUCES NEW FEATURE IN THE
YARDS—THE REGULAR TRAIN
CREWS ARE THE FIREMEN

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 18.—
No. 5,304 is the engine that the Penn-
sylvania railroad has recently equip-
ped with modern fire fighting ap-
paratus and put in commission to as-
sist the district firemen in extinguish-
ing flames in the railroad yards, par-
ticularly near New Jersey and Vir-
ginia avenue.

Because of the high speed of which
the engine is capable and the fact
that it has right of way all the time,
its service will be invaluable, as has
already been shown by its efficiency
in putting out small flames in the
yards without the assistance of the
municipal department. The excellent
switchboard service, operated from
the towers, can give it right of way
without scarcely any delay.

The primary use of the engine will
be in the yards, but it can be brought
to the Union station, or elsewhere
along the road if necessary. The ter-
minal has been so constructed that
water can be reached at any point in
the yards.

This is not an innovation, as the
Pennsylvania has equipped a large
number of similar engines. In many
places they have grown more efficient
than the fire departments, and are
called upon to do most of the work.
No less than 150 fires have been ex-
tinguished by the locomotive fire en-
gines in the various yards and sta-
tions of the Pennsylvania lines.

The railroad has a special organiza-
tion, which becomes effective when-
ever a fire breaks out. The assistant
chief yardmaster acts as chief of the
fire department; he gives general di-
rections in case of a fire and conducts
drill from time to time. Conductors
on the various trains near the scene
of the fire act as chiefs of the various
crews, while the firemen look af-
ter the unreeing of the hose. The
brakemen complete the organization
by acting as hosemen.

VOTES FOR WOMEN BEING DISCUSSED

Following is the amendment, which,
if carried by the voters at the forth-
coming election, will mean that wo-
men will be allowed to vote. It is
accompanied by a portion of the argu-
ments for and against, as printed by
the state for the information of the
electors.

(Official Ballot, Nos. 300 and 301)

Suffrage Amendment
Section 2 of Article II of the Con-
stitution of the State of Oregon shall
be and hereby is amended to read as
follows:

Section 2. In all elections not oth-
erwise provided for by this Constitu-
tion, every citizen of the United States
of the age of 21 years and upwards,
who shall have resided in the state
during the six months immediately
preceding such election, and every
person of foreign birth of the age of
21 years and upwards, who shall have
resided in this state during the six
months immediately preceding such
election, and shall have declared his
or her intention to become a citizen
of the United States one year pre-
ceding such election, conformably to
the laws of the United States on the sub-
ject of naturalization, shall be en-
titled to vote at all elections author-
ized by law.

Suffrage is a duty that should be
performed by either citizen of every
state, otherwise democracy is a fail-
ure; it is a duty that, if shirked,
results in misgovernment, inequality,
and injustice. Those who would evade
this responsibility, because it may en-
tail labor, simply plead laziness. To
call a government a democracy when
half the population is barred from
participation in governmental affairs
is an absurdity.

The same arguments used in de-
fense of depriving women of suffrage
were used to keep the Romans en-
slaved, to keep the peasants of Europe
in serfdom, to clog the progress of
human liberty throughout the ages.
The inequality of suffrage has been
the basic principle that has ever op-
pressed humanity.

There is always an element that re-
sents change. Many a serf fought to
prevent freedom and many a slave op-
posed his own liberation. It should be
the obligation of every individual,
irrespective of sex, whether house-
holder or not, to have a voice in the
making of our laws both civil and na-
tional. Liberty and responsibility for
both sexes in public affairs will im-
prove the quality by stimulating the
study of government. Men and wo-
men can never be pitted against each
other in government, because nature,
which is higher than human law, has
fitted them for companionship. They
must help men in the uplifting of the
world by making democracy and its

consequent development, a revised
dream.

The growth of public sentiment in
favor of this movement all around
Oregon has been, as you know, phe-
nomenal.

Believing that our beloved Oregon
should and will prove that her pro-
gressive spirit is equal to that of the
six equal suffrage states surrounding
her, and add a seventh star to the
galaxy of fully free states, we rest
our case with you at the coming elec-
tion. In the hope that we shall not
be compelled again to make this ex-
pensive and laborious struggle for
equality of rights as voters, we re-
spectfully request you to vote "yes"
for the equal suffrage constitutional
amendment at the coming election.

We, American women, citizens of
the state of Oregon, protest against
the proposal to impose the obligation
of suffrage upon the women of this
state, for the following, among other
reasons:

1.—Because suffrage is to be en-
joyed not as a privilege to be en-
joyed, but as a duty to be performed.

2.—Because hitherto the women of
this state have enjoyed exemption from
this burdensome duty, and no
adequate reason has been assigned
for depriving them of that immunity.

3.—Because conferring suffrage up-
on the women who claim it would
impose suffrage upon the many wo-
men who neither desire it as a privi-
lege nor regard it their duty to seek
it.

4.—Because the need of America is
not an increased quantity, but an im-
proved quality, of the vote, and there
is no adequate reason to believe that
woman's suffrage by doubling the
vote will improve its quality.

5.—Because the household, not the
individual, is the unit of the state,
and the vast majority of women are
represented by household suffrage.

6.—Because the women not so rep-
resented suffer no practical injustice
which giving the suffrage will remedy.

7.—Because equality in character
does not imply similarity in function,
and the duties and life of men and
women are divinely ordered to be
different in the state, as in the home.

8.—Because the energies of women
are engrossed by their present duties
and interests, from which men cannot
relieve them, and it is better for the
community that they devote their en-
ergies to the more efficient perfor-
mance of their present work than divert
them to new fields of activity.

9.—Because political equality will
deprive woman of special privileges
hitherto accorded her by the law.

10.—Because suffrage logically in-
volves the holding of public office,
including jury duty, and office hold-
ing is inconsistent with the duties of
most women.

CANADIAN TRADE IS ON INCREASE

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 18.—
Continued increases in exports from
the United States to our sister coun-
try on the north, Canada, are brought
to light in a current official report of
the bureau of foreign and domestic
commerce. A conservative estimate
of the average export business is
placed at over \$1,000,000 a day.
Three years ago they averaged \$500,-
000 a day, and a dozen years ago they
averaged \$250,000.

According to the latest compilation,
the August statement of exports
shows that the value of merchandise
exported to Canada during the 244
days, from January 1 to August 31,
1919, is practically \$244,000,000, or,
to be more exact, \$243,721,771. Hi-
tuminous coal, automobiles, manu-
factures of iron and steel, lumber,
corn and unmanufactured cotton are
some of the articles which have seen
the largest increase in exportation.
