MILES OF FILMS ARE NOW MADE

**UNITED STATES IS EXPORTING
MANY MILES OF MOVING PIC-
TURES—GROWTH OF INDUS-
TRY REMARKABLE**

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 18.—
The tremendous growth of American
moving picture business abroad is re-
flected in official figures on the im-
portation and exportation of motion
picture films given out by the depart-
ment of commerce and labor. The
article giving the figures also de-
scribes the influence of American pic-
ture films in creating a demand
abroad for articles made in the United
States.

More than 15,000 miles of motion
picture films were exported from the
United States in the last fiscal year,
while nearly 3,000 miles were im-
ported. The exact length of the films ex-
ported in the year ending June 30,
1913, was 80,935,302 feet, valued at
\$8,815,080; the length of films im-
ported was 14,374,786 feet, of "posi-
tives," valued at \$825,082.

A large proportion of the motion
picture films now used in the various
parts of the world are manufactured
in the United States. About two-
thirds of those exported go in the
"unexposed" form, ready for use in
taking pictures in those parts of the
world to which they are sent. Of the
"importations," practically all are "ex-
posed" films, views taken in other
parts of the world for use in the
United States.

NEW STAMPS TO ADVERTISE FAIR

**POSTMASTER GENERAL AUTHO-
RIZES AN ISSUE TO BE PUT ON
SALE ON THE FIRST OF THE
NEW YEAR**

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 18.—Post-
master General Hitchcock has directed
that 80,000,000 one cent, 150,000-
000 two cent, 8,000,000 five cent and
5,000,000 ten cent Panama-Pacific In-
ternational exposition postage stamps
be prepared and placed on sale in the
postoffices beginning January 1, 1913.
The stamps are about three-fourths
of an inch high by one and a sixteenth
inch wide. At the top appear the
words: "U. S. Postage," and "San
Francisco, 1913."

The one cent stamp is green. In the
center appears within a circle a
bust of Balboa, discoverer of the Pa-
cific ocean.

The two cent stamp is red. It re-
presents the Gatun locks of the Pana-
ma canal.

The five cent stamp is blue, and
represents the Golden Gate of San
Francisco harbor.

The ten cent stamp is dark yellow.
The subject is "The Discovery of San
Francisco Bay."

DIFFERENT TYPES OF PROGRESSIVES

The direct primary law means some-
thing to Paul Clagstone, prominent
progressive Republican of Idaho. In
the recent primary election in that
state, Mr. Clagstone was defeated for
the Republican nomination for govern-
or by a plurality of less than 100.
Immediately following the primary,
he was urged by Roosevelt, personally
and the Bull Moose leaders of Idaho
to renounce his Republicanism and
become the candidate of the Progres-
sive party for the same office in the
general election. The reply of Mr.
Clagstone to their appeals is respect-
fully commended to the consideration
of Senator Bourne and his friends. It
follows:

"Two conditions seem to form abso-
lutely impassable obstacles to my ac-
cording to Roosevelt's request that I
run for governor and this is not only
my own judgment but that of my most
trusted friends.

"One is the fact that I continued a
candidate in the P. M. primary to the
end and on. It with any degree
of justice again become a candidate
before the people in this campaign.
Not only would I be condemned by the
great majority of right thinking men,
but I should be untrue to myself as
well."

Primary Foundation of Oregon System
In becoming an independent candi-
date to succeed himself, Senator
Bourne has fully repudiated the direct
primary law. This measure is the
very foundation of the Oregon system
of which Bourne has been an avowed
champion. But this is not the first
time he has repudiated this establish-
ed law of the people. Two years ago
he openly urged Republicans to sup-
port the Democratic nominee for gov-
ernor as against the Republican candi-
date who was regularly nominated
under the direct primary. To Senator
Bourne the direct primary is a sacred
institution so long as it serves his
certain political ambitions. But when
it fails to render that service, then he
advises its repudiation.

BOURNE FAIRLY DEFEATED

**Repudiates Direct Primary Law by
Becoming Independent Candidate.**

Sen. Selling received the Republican
nomination for United States Senator
in a fair and square contest under
the direct primary law. Senator
Bourne was defeated fairly and
squarely in the same election. Are
the voters going to maintain the direct
primary by supporting Selling, the
direct primary nominee, or will they
give their support to Bourne and re-
pudiate that law? Oregon voters will
not be parties to any such prostitution
of this fundamental law of the Oregon
system. They should accept the result
of the primary nominating election
and vote for Selling, who actively
participated in preparing and enacting
all legislation which has secured to
Oregon its present system of popular
government.

Bourne is Inconsistent.

The inconsistency of Bourne is en-
compassed in his independent candidacy
for the senatorship. Bourne vigorously
championed the direct primary so
long as he and his friends receive favor-
able recognition and coveted politi-
cal office. But when the other fellow
wins out under the operation of the
same law, Bourne is the first to re-
pudiate the system and to urge its
repudiation by the electorate. Bourne
cannot justify his independent candi-
dacy. In entering the contest for the
senatorship, he proves himself an en-
emy of the direct primary of which
he is the professed friend and defend-
er.

SELLING IS PROGRESSIVE

**People Approved His Record by Plurality
of 6000 Over Bourne.**

Sen. Selling received the Republican
nomination in the direct primary elec-
tion by a plurality of 6000 over Sen-
ator Bourne. Mr. Selling made the
most of his record as a progressive.
He submitted his record as a peace-
and consistent advocate and support-
er of progressive legislation in this
state. The people approved that re-
cord and nominated him. In the pri-
mary, Mr. Selling carried 37 of the
54 counties, as against four for
Bourne and three for Judge Stephen
A. Lowell, of Pendleton, who is actively
supporting the Republican nominee.
Mr. Selling is today standing on the
same record and platform that won
for him the nomination. He is entitled
to the vote of every elector who be-
lieves in popular government as it is
applied in Oregon's progressive laws.

Preservation of Primary Involved.

It is Sen. Selling and the preserva-
tion of the direct primary law or Jon-
athan Bourne and the repudiation of
the direct primary law. Mr. Voter,
take your choice.
