### TEDDY WILL NOT GIVE UP BULLET TO HIS ASSAILANT

COLONEL DECLARES THAT LEAD IN HIS OWN NOW

CHICAGO, Oct. 19.—Roosevelt spent a very comfortable night. He went to sleep at 11 o'clock and slept until 7 o'clock this morning. His pulse, temperature and respiration are normal. His physicians agree that the crisis is past, and they now predict a speedy recovery.

The Colonel ate a hearty breakfast. On hearing that Schrank, his assailant, had bequeathed the bullet to the New York Historical Society, the Colonel said:

"The bullet belonged to Schrank when it was in the revolver and while it was en route to me. But after it reached me it was mine. I've a personal interest in it, and intend to keep it."

The Colonel will start for Oyster Bay Monday morning.

### ARSENAL FIRE IS GREAT LOSS

### WINDOWS BLOWN OUT BY WIND IN PORTLAND

TELEGRAPHIC COMMUNICATION IN NORTHWEST PARALYZED

Street Car Traffic in the Rose City is Seriously Affected—High Wind Causes Great Damage on Many of the Streets—Window Insurance Companies Will Be Hard Hit by the Storm

PORTLAND, Oct. 19.—The heavy wind storm which has prevailed for some hours has demoralized telegraphic communications in the Northwest.

Street car traffic here is paralyzed and many plate glass windows have been blown out.

Conversation Had With Walker in Which the Tough Said He Could Not Remember's Threat and Then Lie Down and Sleep Allegedly of the Body is Recited—Paul Christie Gives Himself.

NEW YORK, Oct. 19.—District Attorney Whitman's stipulations that Ross, Volton, Schappo and Wajoly would not be prosecuted in the event of their confessing have been submitted in the trial of former Police Lieutenant Becker, charged with the murder of Herman Rosenthal.

Louis Platt testified that he had visited Ross in the Tombs. He said that Ross dropped to his knees and said:

"By the mercy of my mother, Becker had nothing to do with the Rosenthal murder."

The witness testified that a month before the murder Ross had said that he intended to have Rosenthal killed. The witness contradicted himself repeatedly.

Robert Smith, a constable, testified that he had met Walker in front of the Metropolitan hotel. Walker said that he could not remember's threat and then "lie down and sleep along side of his body all night."

## Allies in the Balkan States Said to be Winning the Fight

### Fearing that Former Sultan may Escape, He is Ordered Removed From His Present Prison. Fierce Fighting is Reported in Progress on All Frontiers

Villages Menaced  
HELGRADE, Oct. 19.—It is reported that Turkish irregulars invaded Serbia near Krasovcin and massacred the inhabitants of three villages.

Turks Captured  
SOFIA, Oct. 19.—Bulgarians have occupied the frontier town of Mustapha Pasha, capturing several hundred Turks.

Fighting is in Progress

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 19.—It is announced that General Ennad Pasha repulsed the Montenegrins near Scutari. Turks and Greeks are reported to be battling near Milusa.

German Report Denied  
LONDON, Oct. 19.—Dispatches indicate that the allies in the Balkan states are succeeding. The Turks are desperately opposing the combined Bulgarians and Serbians approaching Uskib. The result is uncertain.

The Turks officially deny that they are planning to loose typhus and cholera germs.

VIENNA, Oct. 19.—The Turks are advancing toward Sofia through Jambana. Another Turkish army is also approaching Philippolis, Bulgaria, according to a message received from Constantinople.

### MT. LAKE IS TO HAVE A SCHOOL

BONDS ARE VOTED AT AN ELECTION HELD YESTERDAY—A STORE AND FEED MILL TO BE ESTABLISHED NEAR SCHOOL.

### Car of Fish Will go Direct to Chiloquin

#### District Game Warden Ramsey Receives Word of the Arrival Here of a Car Tomorrow Evening

A car containing 100,000 trout will arrive in the city tomorrow evening, and, after dropping off a few cans of fish here, will proceed Monday to Chiloquin.

District Game Warden C. M. Ramsey will accompany the car from this city to Chiloquin, and will arrange for the distribution of the fish in the streams in that vicinity. A number of the many youngsters will be planted in the Williamson River and in Spring Creek. The balance will go into the smaller streams in the vicinity of Fort Klamath.

This will be the first car of fish to be sent to the Fort Klamath country. A number of fish have been taken north in the past, but under unfavorable conditions. Now that it is possible to take the fish so close to the streams in which they will be planted by train, it is expected that the results will be better.

### Women Seek to Drive Black Pug From City
