### WHITE GIRL IS TO MARRY PUG SHE DECLARES

#### LEGAL OFFICERS ARE WORKING ON THE CASE

Lucille Cameron is taken before the federal grand jury — Detectives claim to have evidence that Johnson has kept a couple of other girls in his apartments for some time.

Chicago, Oct. 22.—Lucille Cameron was brought from Rockford to appear before the federal grand jury today to declare that she intends to marry Jack Johnson when she is released from custody.

Federal officers are continuing to serve subpoenas. Detectives say they have learned that two other white girls have been living in Jack Johnson's apartments since before his wife committed suicide. One is Helen White of Detroit. The name of the other girl has not been announced.

### LEMON FREIGHT RATES UNCHANGED

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 22.—The Interstate Commerce Commission today declared the advance of freight rates from \$1 to \$1.15 per hundred weight on lemons from California points to Oregon, Washington and Idaho was unjustified.

The commission held that the \$1 advance was unreasonable.

### EFFORT TO OUST OFFICERS FAILS

#### MAYOR NICHOLAS DECLINES TO SIGN A PARTY TO A PLAN TO LEAVE THIS CITY WITHOUT POLICE PROTECTION

The discoloration entirely gone from his eye and displaying no signs of an alleged fracture of the skull or of having been hit in the head with an ax, R. Vance Hutchins appeared before the city council last night and presented charges against Mayor Nicholas, Chief of Police Joe Smith, Officer Greenwood and Officer Hall.

Subsequently Mr. Hutchins conceded to a proposition that the mayor's name be stricken from the list of those who must leave the city's employ because Mr. Hutchins got a black eye a couple of weeks ago.

In Councilman Doty, Hutchins' complaint had an earnest supporter, but Mayor Nicholas declined to permit his appointees to be summarily dealt with, and the effort of Doty and Councilman McGowan to force the city's executive to suspend the men on Hutchins' bare statement that he had been assaulted was unavailing.

With an utter disregard of the English language, Mr. Doty played to the grand stand at the session, but aside from establishing a reputation as a comedian of the rough and tumble order, he accomplished nothing.

The Hutchins' complaint charged that the city officials had been guilty of malfeasance in office. It was presented in writing, but was not even sworn to. Councilman Doty immediately after the complaint had been filed with the recorder, moved that the police officers be suspended without pay pending an investigation.

Mayor Nicholas declared that the motion was out of order. He said that he was jointly charged with an offense with the officers, and he did not propose to sit in judgment on himself. The mayor offered to turn over the gavel to the president of the council, Councilman Crisler, but he had failed to put in an appearance.

Without any formal motion to that effect being made, R. Vance Hutchins secured the document he had originally presented, and, although it was properly a public document, mutilated it by scratching out the name of Mayor Nicholas, and thus withdrawing the charge against the mayor.

The motion to suspend the police officers was repeatedly put by Councilman Doty, but the mayor would not consider it, stating that he had in mind no one who he could appoint on the police force at this time, and he would not leave the city without police protection, even for a single night. The session finally came to an end when a motion to postpone consideration of the matter for a week was carried.

### BULGARIANS ARE EXPECTED TO BE DEFEATED SOON

#### MILITARY EXPERTS BELIEVE AN ASSAULT PLAN FOOLISH

Attack on Adrianople is expected soon—Fortifications are being built and loss of life will be great in the assault—Many Turkish soldiers killed in the withdrawal of a military train

SOFIA, Oct. 22.—It was officially announced that the Bulgarian troops had broken through the Turkish lines from Greece to the Black Sea. This means a Turkish disaster, and probably the fall of Adrianople.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 22.—The announcement that the Bulgarians are besieging Adrianople is regarded as a disaster. The city, and the gardens situated there in withdrawing behind the fortifications.

Military experts predict a disaster for the Bulgarian army. The fortifications of Adrianople are very strong and an assault would be suicidal.
