HOLLISTER MAN LIKES THE CITY

R. P. LATHROP RETURNS TO HIS HOME IN THE SOUTH AFTER AN EXTENDED VISIT IN KLAMATH SECTION

R. P. Lathrop, accompanied by Mrs. Lathrop, will leave for his home at Hollister, Calif., this evening, after spending a few days here looking over his property interests. This is Mr. Lathrop's first visit to Klamath Falls in two years, and he says that the improvements that have been made in recent years are remarkable.

In speaking of streets and hotels Mr. Lathrop states that they are equally as good as those of any city. He has a great deal of confidence in Klamath Falls, and predicts that it will in the course of ten years have a population of at least 20,000.

Mr. Lathrop first became interested in Klamath through the Klamath Canal company's irrigation project, which preceded the reclamation service. He made several trips here when this city was a small village, and has a distinct recollection of exceptionally muddy streets and limited hotel accommodations.

SUFFRAGETTES ARE INCREASING

MOVEMENT IS GROWING RAPIDLY IN ROMANIA—MEETINGS ARE HELD REGULARLY IN ALL OF LARGER TOWNS

BUCHAREST, Oct. 23.—Although the woman suffrage movement was organized in Roumania only a little more than a year ago, Mme. Janculescu, one of its leaders and founder of the first feminist paper in the country, reports an astonishing growth of public sentiment in favor of votes for women. Meetings are being held in all the larger towns, and the demand made at headquarters here for speakers and literature far exceeds the supply.

BRIDGEPORT, Conn., Oct. 23.—Joseph Buonanno, one of the trio captured after the murder of a woman on the outskirts of the city last night, said that she was his wife, and that he killed her while he was intoxicated.

The police found a card of Mrs. Alice Aldrich, a Chicago anti-vice crusader, in the murdered woman's pocket. It is believed that the murder was planned in Chicago, and was possibly in connection with the Jack Johnson case.

Harriman Chiefs to Give Final Orders

Notable Meeting of Railroad Leaders is Held in Portland Today and it is Expected Work will Start

Notables of the Harriman system are expected to issue orders in a few days for the rushing of work on the proposed line of railroad which will not only place Klamath Falls on a main line, but will make this city the terminus of the road which will tap the vast territory between this city and Reno, Nev.

A conference between President William Spruells of the Southern Pacific, President A. L. Mohler of the Union Pacific and Julius Kruttschnitt, director of maintenance and operation of the Harriman group of lines, is to program in Portland today. Announcement has been made from the general office of the Southern Pacific of the intention to carry on the extension work with all speed, but it has developed that no orders for active field work have yet been given.

CANUCKS HIT AT BIG SHOE TRUST

PINK OF \$1,000 PER DAY WILL BE IMPOSED ON CONCERN BELONGING TO BE ACTING IN RESTRAINT OF TRADE

OTTAWA, Oct. 23.—The government tribunal appointed under Canada's trust laws today decided that the United Shoe Machinery company is a combination in restraint of trade. There is no appeal from this decision, which makes the trust liable to cancellation of all its patents in Canada and to a fine of \$1,000 daily for every day it attempts to do business in the country.
