SOLDIERS WILL DRAW LOTS TO DECIDE FATE

RESULT OF THE COURT MARTIAL SHOWS CAPITAL CITY

Emergent General With His Staff and a Number of His Soldiers Will Be Sent to Death—General Beltran Presides at the Trial—One Man in Every Ten Must Face the Firing Squad

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 24.—It was announced today that Diaz, his staff and one out of every ten men of his command will be shot. The city is shocked.

The Diaz force captured at Vera Cruz yesterday numbers 2,000 men. This means that 200 of them will be executed. The men will draw lots to determine who will die.

General Beltran presided at the court-martial.

The greatest interest locally is taken in the race for the office of sheriff. There are five candidates in the field, including the representative of the socialists, but the race will probably be confined to the regular republican, democratic and two independent candidates.

Friends of each of the candidates are confident of success at the polls. By reason of being the regular republican candidate, Charles Low is the favorite in the betting, but the race is conceded so close that there have been but few bets made.

With the opening of headquarters on Main street by the republicans, it is expected that more interest will be aroused in the presidential contest. Up to date, however, the interest seems to be confined in the race for county office.

LONDON, Oct. 24.—A message to the stock exchange from Sofia says that the Bulgarians have captured Kirit Killomet. This cannot be confirmed. Advantages still must fall before the road to Constantinople is open.

ASSESSMENT OF 90 CENTS PER THOUSAND IS DECLARED TO BE TOO HIGH—RATE OF 50 CENTS IS WANTED

YOSEMITE NOT IN IT WITH CRATER

CAPTAIN ARANT IS OF THE OPINION THAT THE WONDERS OF KLAMATH COUNTY PARK ARE GREATER IN COUNTRY

That Crater National Park offers more wonderful sights for the tourist than any other park in the United States, with the possible exception of the Yellowstone, is the confident opinion of Superintendent Arant, who recently attended a meeting of national park superintendents held in the Yosemite Valley.

The great Yosemite has nothing on the park in this country, according to Captain Arant. In fact, the wonders of the Yosemite are nothing compared to those to be seen in Crater park.

"The formation in Yosemite Valley is different from that in our park," said Captain Arant. "In the California park there is a glacial formation, while in Crater park the formation is volcanic."

The best equipped telephone office and system of any city under 30,000 population in the northern division, comprising Oregon, Washington and Idaho, is what is promised Klamath Falls by the officials of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company.

C. F. Cole, district traffic chief, and E. G. Westberg, general foreman, are now in the city consulting with Manager Robertson, relative to the progress of the work of rebuilding the system in Klamath Falls.

The new home of the company on Seventh street is said to be the second best in appearance of any in the entire three states. The work of installing the new switchboard and connections is being handled by a class of expert workmen from the General Electric company.

At the present time there are nearly 900 lines accommodating 650 phones, but the new switchboard has a capacity of 100 separate lines, which, with very little difficulty, can be increased to 1,100, as the growth of the city demands, and the number of the phones in use should increase. With this large additional number of lines it will enable all of the business section of the city to secure private lines, and will relieve the present lines, and will relieve the present lines.

Keeps Silent to the Last; Sheep Herder is Dead

With Side Literally Cooked, John Hollenbeck Lingers for Six Days Death Comes this Morning

Maintaining to the last strict silence as to his antecedents, John Hollenbeck died in Blackburn hospital at 4 o'clock this morning, after suffering six days from burns sustained when he fell into the hot springs east of this city. Hollenbeck seemed to be improving until yesterday, when he took a turn for the worse. About 2 o'clock this morning, when a nurse visited his room, he seemed to be about the same, but when the next call was made the man was dead.

In spite of repeated efforts on the part of the attending physician, Dr. Wright, and the nurses at the hospital

Hollenbeck declined to tell anything about himself except that he had herded sheep near Wallace, Idaho, a few years ago.

Dave Edler, who employed Hollenbeck, stated today that he had no information concerning the deceased Hollenbeck had been working for him but a couple of months.

Last Friday Hollenbeck, tired after standing guard over a band of sheep all night, laid down on a plank stretched across the hot springs. He fell asleep and fell into the boiling water. He succeeded in getting out without assistance, but he was so seriously injured that he died.
