With the new system there will be very little trouble with lines out of order, as the office will be equipped with an automatic tester, so that the wire chief's desk will know of any disorder even before it is discovered by the customer. The operators are furnished a set of answers, and when any of these will not cover the question of the customer, connection must be made with the desk of the chief operator, who will furnish the information desired.

It is expected that it will take about six weeks longer to complete the installation of the switchboard and connections in the office, but it will probably be two months before the outside work, of new poles and cables, is finished. A large crew is now at work on the lines. There will be no overhead wires across Main street, as there are to be run underground and connections made with the office buildings and stores from the center of the block.

DEAD NEWSBOY ACCORDED HONOR

CHICAGO, Oct. 24.—A funeral such as was never known before was accorded "Bully" Bug, "newsboy," who gave his life that a girl might live. Greater honor is pageantry and grandeur has been paid kings and statesmen beloved by nations, but this was a spontaneous tribute from the hearts of men and women in honor of a hero.

Fifteen thousand persons, singing "Nearer My God, To Thee," crowded about his casket on a street corner in Gary, Ind. By their very numbers they had blocked a mile long funeral cortege and prevented the holding of a church service.

Strong men of many races, workers in steel mills that were closed in Bug's honor, wept as they formed in line with their employers and walked slowly past the coffin of the dead "newsboy." Their wives and children were with them, and many stretched forth their hands in an effort to express their reverence by offering money for the erection of a monument.

BOLD THIEF MAY ESCAPE PENALTY

WITH OVER A MILLION DOLLARS HE IS IN HIDING, AND MAKES HIS OWN TERMS WITH THE OFFICERS OF THE LAW

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 24.—With cash and negotiable securities worth \$1,020,000 in his possession, all of which he stole from the vault of the Merchants Union Trust company, Walter S. Shrouds, in safe retreat, dictated terms of restitution with impunity, binding the directors of the company to influence the officials of the state from the governor down.

The loot included stocks and bonds issued by the Oregon Short Line, the Oregon-Washington Railroad company and the Portland Gas and Coke company. Shrouds was indicted without the preliminaries of arrest and arraignment. George Burham, Jr., of the Baldwin Locomotive works, to whom most of the securities belonged, went his bail under the indictment.

The efforts to insure immunity for Shrouds had reached a point where it was almost a moral certainty that the indictments would be quashed on motion of District Attorney Rolan, when it was discovered that the act of 1909 compels prosecution by the banking commissioner.

Learning this, Shrouds, still in hiding, served notice upon all concerned that he was prepared to prosecute a charge of compounding a felony, and that the money left in his hands out of his stealings would permit him to put up a glorious battle in the courts. The officials of the trust company will appear before Governor Tenner at Harrisburg and petition him to exert his influence with Attorney General Bell and Banking Commissioner Smith to permit a general abandonment of all proceedings against Shrouds to the end that they may carry out their good faith agreement with him.

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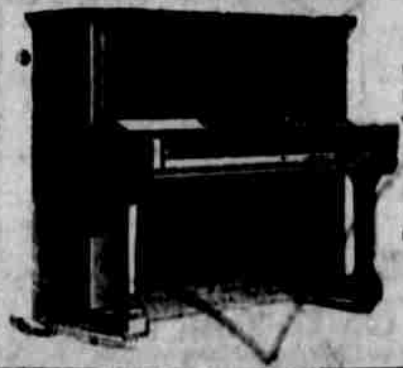
