WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 28.—

President Taft returned to the executive office today. He issued an attack on the democrats for making "tariff for revenue only" the issue of the campaign. He declared that Wilson's election would be a menace to the prosperity of the country, just as Cleveland's election was in 1892.

The president said:

"The choice of the voters should not be obscure. It is better to actually be assured of prosperity on the part than to have a depression of business and paralyzed industries on the other."

The president declared that he believed that a surprise was in store for his opponents on the coming 6th of November.

"ANTLER" SINKS TWO MEN SWIM

HANBROUGH AND JACKSON
HAVE HARD EXPERIENCE ON
LOWER LAKE—SWIM TO THE
TULE TO SAVE LIVES

The gasoline motor boat "Antler" struck a submerged log in the lower lake Sunday afternoon, and took water so rapidly that the two occupants were forced to swim for their lives. The two men, Tom Jackson and J. M. Hanbrough, arrived in the city about dark, suffering intensely from exposure. They were given prompt medical aid, and this morning they were reported to be but little the worse for their experience.

Messrs. Jackson and Hanbrough left this city about noon Sunday, to hunt on the lower lake. They killed a single quail, and started for home. When about two miles from the boat landing here the boat struck a submerged log. Immediately the water rushed through the hole, and efforts to bail the craft were unavailing. Soon the water rose until the engine was put out of commission.

Then an ear was improvised from a coat, and the boat was pulled toward the shore. When about a quarter of a mile from the nearest tules the men were forced to take to the cold water. After tremendous efforts they succeeded in getting ashore. Shivering with cold, they started toward this city, but the passage was interrupted by a wide and deep channel, which they were forced to swim. Finally, however, they set their feet on dry land and managed to get to the Baldwin hotel, where they were met by friends and given assistance.

Mr. Hanbrough is a brother of former United States Senator Hanbrough of North Dakota, who recently completed twenty years in congress.

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LAKE COUNTY IS CATTLE COUNTRY

SHO SHIPMENT OF CATTLE MADE
FROM THE CHEWACAN AND
NUMBER LAKE VALLEY
MANY MORE TO GO

That this is some cattle country was demonstrated recently when between 2,000 and 3,000 head were marketed from the Chewacan and Summer Lake valleys alone, says the Chewacan Press.

Messrs. Kelay, Currier and Martin have just returned from the drive to Olene, and they report that over 5,000 cattle were sent to the southern markets by way of Klamath Falls by stock men from Lake county. Nearly half of this number came from the vicinity of Paisley.

It is safe to say that at least 10,000 will be marketed before another season closes, which means that Lake county is receiving annually from this one industry alone about \$600,000.

This vast herd was sold for an average of not less than \$60 per head, bringing to Lake county \$360,000.

Railroad War will Help the Klamath Country

Purpose of the Harriman System in
Rushing Work on the Modoc
Northern is to Block W. P.

The purpose of the Southern Pacific is rushing to completion the extension of its line from Nevada to this city has leaked out. It is to entrench against the Western Pacific.

Already the war between the Harriman system and the Gould lines has assumed great proportions, and it is certain that one of the results will be the making of Klamath Falls the terminus of the Laramie branch.

It is asserted that plans of the Gould interests for extending their line in the West have become known to the Harriman crowd, and that they seek now to prevent them all at the

"pockets" so as to embarrass them as much as possible.

Surveys for the extension of the Western Pacific from points in Western Nevada to Portland, to Pocatello, Idaho, and to Los Angeles have been partially completed. The proposed route to Portland has been definitely determined on, say the Gould line officials. The survey has been made as far north as Lahaviv.

Another plan to counteract the latest Harriman move is for the Western Pacific to enter into an alliance with the Hill interests for extending the Oregon Trunk to a connection with the Western Pacific. Preliminary surveys for building the Oregon Trunk into San Francisco have been made.

Hector Files Voluntary Petition in Bankruptcy After Hard Siege

Meeting with San Francisco Creditors Comes to Nothing. Liabilities are Placed at \$49,000 with Assets of \$23,000. Meeting to be Held Next Month

A voluntary petition in bankruptcy

was filed today with J. C. Rutledge, referee in bankruptcy, by G. M. Hector. The first meeting of creditors will be held in the office of the referee November 11, at 5 p. m.

According to the petition, Mr. Hector's liabilities amount to \$49,000, and assets \$23,000.

Several small suits were recently started against Mr. Hector, and this led to an investigation by the representative of the San Francisco Board of Trade. It was expected that it would be possible to arrange a

meeting, but a final arrangement with creditors came to nothing, and the petition in bankruptcy followed.

Mr. Hector has been one of the most popular merchants in the city. His failure will come as a great surprise. He has accepted a position with another firm in the city, and has

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
