STUDENTS ARE LEARNING GAME

FOOTBALL MATCH WILL BE
MORE INTERESTING AS HIGH
SCHOOL BOYS HAVE DISCOVERED
SOME FINE POINTS

The football game Saturday was rather disappointing to the Junior and Senior classes, because it did not contain the excitement in athletics to the satisfaction of either class.

A meeting was held this afternoon by both teams to discuss the situation and to arrange for another game which will take place either the coming Saturday or November 10th.

The game Saturday was full of drama, despite the score, which was 0 to 0. A spectacular play was made when Metcalfe, the Junior quarterback, tackled Rigg after Rigg had made it twenty-yard gain. The Junior goal was threatened but aside in the last half, while on the other hand the ball was in Senior territory a majority of the time. The Juniors put up a good defense, but were weak in offense, while the Seniors were weak on the line, but were very aggressive. These faults will be overcome with practice.

One feature of the game was the failure of the forward pass, which was tried time after time without success. Line busting and end runs predominated, while a few punts by McClure met with success.
