MRS. MCCOMAS SHOTS HERSELF IN NIGHT TEMPLE

Husband Admits That He Killed a Woman in Los Angeles Four Years Ago, But He Is Not Now Under Suspicion—Claims That He Shot Los Angeles Woman After She Had Threatened His Life

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 29.—Following a midnight tour of the beach resorts, Mrs. Lena McComas, wife of a wealthy mining engineer, quarreled with her husband as a result of jealousy, and shot herself in the right temple. Her condition is critical. She was taken to the Adler hospital.

McComas is not under suspicion, although he admits that he shot and killed Mrs. Charlotte Noyes in Los Angeles four years ago, and was acquitted.

MANY MEN WILL NOT BE VOTERS

CENSUS BUREAU MAKES AN ESTIMATE OF THE NUMBER OF BALLOTS THAT WILL BE CAST AT ELECTION NOVEMBER 9
