LAKE COUNTY DEAL IS MADE

**TRACT OF TIMBER IS SOLD TO
MILWAUKEE FIRM, ACCORD-
ING TO PORTLAND FIRM—THE
PRICE WAS \$400,000**

A deal whereby 20,000 acres of
yellow pine timber in Lake county
has been sold by the Oregon Land
and Livestock company of Eugene to
Schroeder Lumber company of Mil-
waukee, Wis., has just been completed
in this city, says the Portland Jour-
nal. The Whitmer-Kelly company of
Portland handled the transaction.
The price paid by the big Wisconsin
company is understood to have been
\$400,000.

The timber lies just northeast of
the town of Lakeview in townships
21 and 22 east, and range 28 and 29
south.

R. A. Booth, the millionaire mill
operative, is president of the Oregon
Land and Livestock company, and
George H. Kelly, a pioneer timber-
man of Oregon, is secretary. These
two and John F. Kelly are among the
heaviest stockholders in the com-
pany.

Never in the history of the timber
and lumbering business has there
been such a demand for choice tim-
ber tracts in a presidential year as
at present, say prominent lumber-
men of this city. The deal with the
Milwaukee company, it is said, is only
a harbinger of some big transfers
that will involve the changing hands
of millions of Eastern capital.
